ENGLAND

EGGS 40 YEARS OLD.

Members of Zoological Society Partake of Unique Breakfast.

Members of the council of the Royal Zoological Society of Ireland, whose custom it is to have breakfast at the gardens each Saturday before proceeding on a tour of inspection, found a novelty on the menu on Saturday in the shape of Chinese preserved eggs 40 years old. The contents had become, it was said, a sort of jelly of a very delicate flavor.

Mr. and Mrs. George Lane, of 32 Waterloo street, Hammersmith, celebrated their diamond wedding, having been married at St. Pancras Church on Feb. 24, 1870. Mr. Lane is 84, and his wife two years younger. A new Liberal club has been opened at Skegness on premises which first formed a Methodist chapel, and afterwards a concert hall, restaurant, gymnasium, Salvation Army barracks, auction room, public hall, and school.

As the Jewish population of Great Britain is not more than 300,000, the return of 15 Jews to the new Parliament may be considered a handsome representation.

At the end of March, 1909, Great Britain had 20 battleships built and building, 118 cruisers, 8 scouts, 23 torpedo vessels, 171 torpedo boat destroyers, 80 torpedo boats, and 68 submarines.

There has died Mr. Mark Andrew Chivers, who served the Times sub-editorially for over half a century until 1892, when he retired. It is recorded of him that he detested the "tape," which "vomited news at him."

FIRE HEROINE.

Young Woman's Gallantry in Saving Two Girls Recognized.

Miss Beatrice Daisy Dunton, of Lambeth, has received from the Society for the Protection of Life from Fire, a certificate and a gift of money in recognition of her promptness and gallantry at a fire in South Lambeth road last year. At the time of the fire, which took place at a news agent's shop, Miss Dunton was upstairs, and by rushing through the flames she was able to reach two children, whom she carried to a place of safety. Another child was burned to death.

The death occurred at Cheltenham, in his 90th year, of Lieut.-Col. Wm. Campbell Molloy, who retired from the army nearly 50 years ago. He commanded the Gordon Highlanders in the early stages of the Indian Mutiny when it formed a part of Sir James Outram's force. He fought at the siege and capture of Lucknow and in many other engagements.

EARL SINGS TO BLIND.

Earl of Shaftesbury Takes Prominent Part in an Entertainment.

The Earl of Shaftesbury sang three songs at an entertainment given in the Chelsea town hall to a thousand of the blind poor of London. The first Cape grapes of the season have reached Covent Garden. Yorkshire miners are protesting against coal getting on Sundays. The Blackpool promenades are to be extended at a cost exceeding \$30,000. In Manchester, during the last five years over 500 public house licenses have been abolished.

The continued strike of miners in Northumberland and Durham is seriously affecting trade.

The King gave \$50 to the Brighton police-aided scheme for clothing poor and destitute children.

In future blind persons will be allowed to travel free of charge on the Leicester corporation tram cars.

Manchester's aqueduct, 100 miles long, which cost \$2,500,000, carried 100,000,000 gallons of water daily.

A bag of 240 farthings has been received at the office of the Anti-Socialist Union of Great Britain towards the million shilling fund to fight socialism.

The United Kingdom drank 24,453,556 gallons of whiskey last year—a pretty liberal refreshment, though 5,000,000 gallons less than the previous year.

While making visits at Dartmoor Prison, Mr. Murray, the medical officer, was attacked by a convict named North, who was at once overpowered by warders.

The old Surrey Chapel in London, of which Rev. Rowland Hill was for 50 years pastor, is being converted into an electric theatre.

The Cunard liner Umbria, which left Liverpool for New York on her last voyage, brought \$25,000 worth of ostrich feathers to America.

The Bishop of London says every husband and wife would be the better if they had a fortnight's holiday away from each other every year.

The death has occurred at Bridgend of Mr. Robert Leyson, a Welsh bard, and a member for thirty years of Bridgend Board of Guardians.

NELSON RELIC.

Interesting Ledgers from the Flagship Victory Have Been Secured.

The Trafalgar relic, consisting of ledgers from which prize money and the £200,000 voted by parliament were paid, has been secured for Nelson's birthplace, into which the ledgers have been deposited.

The co-operation of the Royal London Ophthalmic Hospital with the county council, a refraction department for school children will soon be opened, with accommodation for the eye treatment of 12,000 children annually.

The new silver coinage for the Australian Commonwealth is being produced at the Mint. One of the prettiest of the coins is the sixpenny piece. The reverse bears in the centre the arms of the Commonwealth, supported by the kangaroo and the emu, and bearing a star as a crest.

Sir John Cass died in 1718 while signing the will which brought St. Botolph School, Aldgate, into existence, and pen and parchment were stained with his blood. Five hundred children, each wearing a crimson-tipped goose quill, Tuesday attended a bi-centenary service.

The visiting committee has reported to the Chelmsford Guardians that a number of the children in the workhouse have received an education for three years owing to an epidemic of ringworm.

A strong branch of the National League of Young Liberals has been formed in the Board of Prisoners. It is styled the Hford Seven Kings, and Goodman's branch.

Among the wreaths placed on Sir John Cass's tomb in Westminster Abbey, lately in commemoration of the anniversary of his birth, was a laurel wreath. "From Six Old Lyceum Pitts."

Shadwell Market, which was purchased by the corporation of London for over \$500,000, having proved a failure for market purposes, it is proposed to appropriate a portion of the site for a public recreation ground or gardens.

IRELAND

GOLDSMITH'S HOME.

Historic Residence of the Poet in His Earliest Days Restored.

The historic residence of Rev. Charles Goldsmith, at Lissay, the home of the childhood and boyhood of Oliver Goldsmith is to be restored by the Westmeath County Council.

Fred W. Harvey, B.A., Middletown, has been promoted to the charge of Ballyglass National School, Wicklow. A gift of \$3,000 was presented to the technical school at Banbridge, County Down, for the erection of a one-story annex.

The Hamburg-America Line have ordered three steamships, each of 12,000 tons, from the firm of Harland & Wolff, Belfast.

A cattle-drive took place recently at Clondroon, Milford, on the lands of Mr. J. D. Blake, who resides at Woodlawn, Castlebar.

Miss Margaret Gargan, Clonmany, was appointed midwife for the Gortin Dispensary District of Omagh Union, at a salary of \$120 per annum.

One man was killed and three seriously injured by the fall of the scaffolding, while working on the convent of St. Louis buildings, Monaghan. Mr. Alexander Campbell, senior assistant-inspector-general, Royal Irish Constabulary, at headquarters, Dublin Castle, is retiring after a service of 42 years.

At a conference of Irish postoffice clerks in Dublin it was alleged that the terms of conscription and other diseases were in mail bags by thousands, and a resolution was passed.

A WHALE ASHORE.

Finny Leviathan Lost Its Reckoning and Landed High, Dry and Dead.

A large whale was washed ashore at Banna, near Ballyheigue, recently. The whale, about 55 feet long and 7 feet high, came ashore dead. The teeth and enormous jaws were taken possession of by the residents of the village.

The recent death of Mr. Patrick McKewen, of Maghernahely, occasioned widespread regret in and around Bessbrook, County Armagh.

The Carlingford Lough commission has under consideration the completion of a contract with the Dublin Dockyard Company for the building of a steam tug to cost \$26,000.

The death took place recently of a well-known Derry master mariner, Capt. Robt. Fletcher, deceased for over 30 years was engaged in the service of the firm of Steel & Beanie, and was a popular figure in Derry shipping circles.

Two young men of the farming class, named Philip Garin, of Tona, and Patrick Sheridan, of Strahee, were killed in a gravel pit at Aughagower, County Mayo, by the collapse of a high bank under which they were buried.

The Gortletteragh branch of the United Irish League passed a resolution congratulating the sturdy men of Antrim and County Londonderry who were making to banish the hand-grabbers from their midst, and to restore the evicted tenants to their homes.

The residence of Capt. the Hon. John Campbell, of despatched County Galway, was visited by a burglar, who donned a suit of livery, which he discovered in the servants' quarters. This conspicuous costume led to his arrest.

The body of Duncan Galbraith, mate of the Glasgow steamer Walrus, and a native of Ardrishak, was found floating in the River Lagan at Belfast.

SCOTLAND

MELROSE ASTIR.

Memorial Window Erected to Gifted Hymn-Writer, Mrs. Cousins.

Both golfing and fishing have been at a standstill at North Berwick owing to the weather.

Dargavel Mansel House, an historic and beautiful building, about a mile from Bishopston Station, North Berwick, was destroyed by fire lately. The damage is about \$50,000.

Cutter House, the historic mansion of the Cuter estate, about 7 miles from Aberdeen, was completely destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at something like \$50,000.

Col. Richard John Bailey, late commanding officer of the First Orkney Artillery Volunteers, and retired captain of the Gordon Highlanders, died at his residence in Kirkwall on the 21st of January. Col. Bailey rose from the ranks, and had the honor of giving the late prince imperial some instruction in military matters.

In Renfrew last year, there were 145 births, 76 deaths and 24 marriages.

A merchant in Glasgow was fined \$50 for selling margarine for butter. The "Lancet" has noted offences in Patrick last year, a decrease of over 500.

Mr. J. Paterson has been appointed manager of the Glasgow Labor Exchange.

Mr. James Goodall, one of the best-known banking officials in Glasgow, is dead.

There were 4,443 cases of infectious disease in Glasgow the third week in January.

In West Perthshire the electorate numbers 8,547, and 7,444 voted—over 87 per cent.

Mr. James R. Reid has been appointed president of the Celtic Society of Glasgow.

The historic little Border town of Melrose was astir the other day when Lord Ardwil unveiled a memorial window erected in St. Aidan's Church to the gifted hymn writer, Mrs. Cousins.

Her best known work, the "Lancet," is a special favorite with all classes, and subscriptions towards the memorial were received from nearly all parts of the world. It is a very fine piece of work of antique English glass, and fully illustrates the popular hymn referred to.

A memorial service for the late Bishop Dowden was held recently in St. Mary's Episcopal Cathedral, and references of his death were made from a number of city pulpits.

The Rev. Charles Scott Burdon, Blackhill Parish Church, Longside, Aberdeen, was last week elected minister of Dundee and Fowls, Forfarshire.

At a meeting of the Aberdeen Church Presbytery it was agreed to sustain the call from Trinity Parish Church, Aberdeen, to the Rev. David Alexander Miller, assistant, St. Mark's, Dundee.

The semi-jubilee of the Rev. George Steven, of St. Bernard's United Free Church, Henderson Row, Edinburgh, was celebrated a week ago, when several congratulatory addresses were presented.

The Earl and Countess of Dalhousie have returned to Brechin Castle, Forfarshire, from visiting the Earl and Countess of Anstruther at Grimsithorpe Castle, Lincolnshire.

Glasgow Labor Exchange (the central institution of Scotland) was formally opened on the 31st ult. by Lord Provost McInnes Shaw. About 1,400 registered on that day.

PLENTY OF SALMON.

Fishing in the Rivers Dee, Don and Spey Opened Auspiciously.

The new member for West Perthshire, the Marquis of Tullibardine, M. V. O., D. S. O., is the heir of the Duke of Atholl, and was born in 1871.

The Rev. George Alexander Stalker, M. A., B. D., Inverchaulin, has been elected minister of Kenmuir Parish Church, near Glasgow.

For the purpose of stimulating recruiting for the territorial force it is proposed to have a parade and route march in Edinburgh on March 12.

Mr. Alexander Turnbull, C. E., Greenock, died on Thursday. For many years he occupied the position of master of works and burgh surveyor for Greenock.

Salmon fishing in the Dee, Don and Spey has opened under favorable auspices. Fish is abundant, of excellent quality, and free from traces of disease.

NEW FRESH AIR SCHOOL.

more converts are made to the fresh-air theory on the spot.

Take a peep into the school yard any morning. You will find a most astonishingly apparelled coterie. Each child is in the little canvas bag described before. The curious affair reaches to the waist.

It keeps the body, feet and legs as warm and cozy as if the tiny wearer were but a few feet away from a heated stove.

The teachers clothe themselves in similar garments while instructing and the class goes through its lessons in geography, spelling, etc., with a vigor never seen in ordinary schools.

Here is an example of the routine work of a pupil in the Fresh Air School 8:45—Report at teacher's desk. Take off wraps. Devotions.

9:30—Devoted to dressing the children in the "cold-weather" garments. Each child's accoutrement is carefully inspected by Miss Mills or one of her assistants. Little hands are pushed into the warm fleece-lined mittens, the canvas bag adjusted and each youngster helped to his place at the bench in the schoolyard.

9:50 to 10:05—Reading and spelling and blackboard instruction in the schoolroom, with every window flung wide open.

10:05 to 11 and 11 to 11:30—More study periods and then home for dinner. The afternoon session is similarly divided.

If rosy cheeked, spirited children be regarded as proof that Miss Mills' "new thought" school is beneficial, the idea is a great success. The youngsters are all remarkable examples of energy, quick-witted and bright-eyed. To punish them no rods are needed. The teacher has but to bring the "all lessons will be taught indoors today" and there is a howl of remonstrance and instant "order." To withhold from the pupils the romp in the cold bungalow is regarded the severest of deprivations.

Experiments of this sort have been tried frequently for the sick and ailing, but never before for the strong and healthy, and if any skepticism as to the wisdom of Miss Mills' plan exists in the minds of the parents of the children who attend, a visit to the school soon dissipates it.
