Leafs Are Boiling Out in Local Option Town of Macon, Georgia.

THE TWIRLERS LOOSEN UP

Speed 'Em Over a Little, and Batting Averages Strike the Skids—Winter Works Well.

Macon, Ga., March 24. — Another step forward in the training stunts of the Toronto ball team is another advance toward the goal of physical based condition.

From gentle exercises to the hardest kind of games is not a long step after all. Yesterday marked tremendous promotion in the work of the pitchers, all standing up with double speed of first two days, and the hitting in the afternoon fell off amazingly as a result. Two days cannot sharpen eyes for midsummer speed.

True, pitchers are at that stage, but cut down from what they had been doing. A curve or two was introduced, but the main attention was to control.

Winter Stands Alone.

Winter has not used speed yet, but no other twirler in the squad aspires to that deceptive speed. The curve ball is all cutting down in the hands of Phelps and Kewer, whose great arms, fielding was full of speed, and closes every first thing was preceded by hunting.

Johnnie Lash describes it as in no particular spot, just all over. Heat in the sun is oppressive, but it boils out in short time, only to add to the further developments after each workout.

Conditions Ideal.

All tends to lead to one goal, and the end of the week will see the squad in pretty fair shape. Willie Kewer says no place in the south can equal Macon for conditioning, plenty of hot sun, and no dangerous local sports.

There is a plan, beginning Saturday, to play games every day. Two miles between the city and the field, regular battles twice a day, with Macon taken on a couple of times after the regulars and second engage. It spells ten months every day and five weeks of seasons of playing the locals. Exhibitions will begin with other cities then. Albany, Ga., has asked for a game next week, and may get one.

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## Brockton Cop to Toss Weights at Next Olympic Renewal

Brockton, Mass., March 25.—Jesse E. Appleby, Brockton policeman-athlete, has been selected by John E. Sullivan, former president of the A. A. U., now president of the Olympic committee, to represent America in the coming big Olympic games.

Appleby is twenty-seven. He is the youngest member of the Brockton force and one of the best athletes in the city. Sullivan had relied upon Denis J. Mahoney, who holds the shot-putting and hammer-throwing championships in Scotland and Ireland, but Mahoney is now coaching the University of California weight throwers and will be ineligible. Sullivan needs six men in the hammer and six in the discus events. The trials will be held in New York in August and Appleby has been assured he will get a place on the team.

In a field meet here last year Appleby threw the discus 132 feet 10 1/2 inches, and this satisfied Sullivan. Mahoney, who holds the record, with 138 feet 10 1/2 inches.

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## JOHNSON HAS SKULL LIKE A TEXAS STEER

Skull of World's Heavyweight Champion Found To Be From One-Half to Two-Thirds of an Inch Thick.

San Francisco, Cal., March 24.—Jack Johnson, heavyweight champion of the world, submitted to an X-ray picture being taken of his skull today, and it required more than five minutes for the electrical rays to penetrate the heavy cartilage covering the champion's skull and make a picture on a plate. The surgical savants present marvelled at the thickness of Johnson's skull, which measures from one-half to two-thirds of an inch. From five seconds to fifteen seconds only is required to penetrate the average man's skull. According to the scientists present, the same blow which would kill an ox or steer at the stockyards barely would jar Jack Johnson. He has been built to withstand all but the blows of a steel projectile.

Among the celebrated medical and surgical savants who gathered at the clinic was Dr. P. D. Roland, for eleven years trainer and physical director of the Chicago Athletic Club teams.

## MARTIN SHERIDAN IS TRAINING FOR STRUGGLE

Will Re-Enter Athletics in Effort to Take Down All-Round Championships.

[Canadian Press.] New York, March 24.—The Telegraph says Martin Sheridan, of the Irish American A. C., record holder in the all-around A. A. U. championships, has started training for the coming championship struggle. Sheridan did not compete in last year's event, which was won by Thompson, the youthful California athlete. He has decided to re-enter the game this year in an effort to better his world's record. Sheridan weighs about 220 pounds, and will have to reduce to at least 185 pounds to be in first-class shape for the big contest, which is held annually on Independence Day.

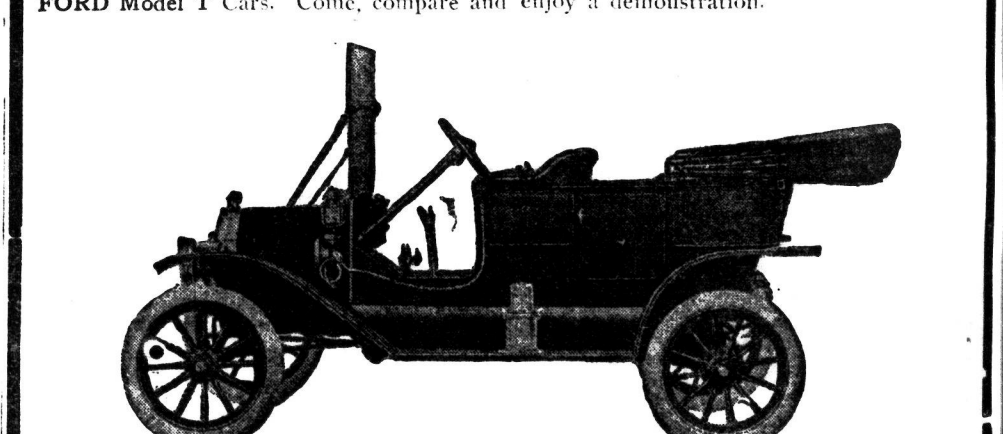

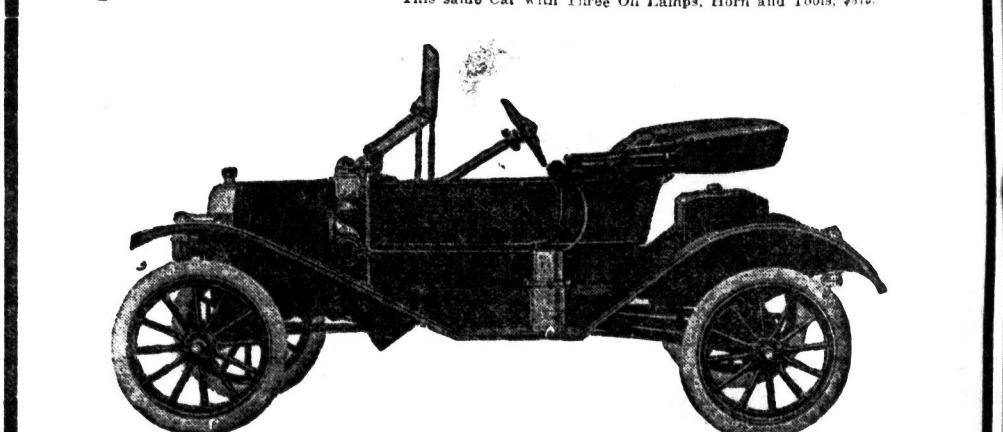
