A NEW FORCE IN THE WORLD IS GERMANY

The People the Stockholders,
the Government the Board
of Directors.

Berlin, April 26.--Robert J. Thompson, American consul at Hanover, made some interesting remarks at the dinner given by the American Chamber of Commerce in Berlin to its Hamburg members. If, he said, the canals and navigable rivers of Germany were reproduced in the United States in like proportion as regards length of watercourses and area of land, they would extend in forty parallel lines across the continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and in twenty parallel lines from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico. There is a greater freight tonnage on the River Rhine than on all of America's Great Lakes System.

Germany's prosperity and material progress are such that she must employ upward of three million of women workers in the fields to garner the harvests, so plentiful through intensive and scientific cultivation. Consul Thompson spoke of Germany as a really new force in the world. To him the country appears to be organized on the principle of the people being the stockholders and the Government the board of directors of a great industrial concern. The question of government, in its ethical sense, resolved itself into a matter of the direction and control of the natural resources and productive forces of the country for the greatest good of all.

The overworked shillshole of the rights of man were left to the academics and the demagogues, while real Germany, with her modern teamwork and practical application of all sciences, was quietly but surely stepping into the lead among the nations of the earth. Mr. Thompson is a believer in commercial reciprocity between Germany and the United States, and says that for every reduction the latter might make in the chemical, rubber, textile and steel and iron schedules, Germany is ready and able to give something in return.

TRADE COMMISSIONERS.
Ottawa, April 25.--Reorganization of the trade commissioner service of Canada abroad is under way. There are vacancies to be filled at Amsterdam, Paris, Berlin, Shanghai, and Havana and the territory of the various commissioners will be reallocated.

MASQUERADED AS WOMAN

Armenian Admits He Donned Dresses to Escape From Titanic.

Hamilton, April 25.--Ashan Kricorian, an Armenian, who was mentioned by Major Peuchen in his evidence at the Titanic inquiry at Washington yesterday as crouching in the boat in which the major's party escaped, with woman's clothing over him and a broken arm, arrived here this morning and told a thrilling story of the panic in the steerage when the boat hit.

The foreigner said the shock as felt in the steerage made the boat quiver. Kricorian admitted that he used women's clothing to escape. He was bound for Brantford with a churn, which was also rescued, while 23 other Armenians drowned.
