## CHURCHILL IN SPAIN TO ADVISE ON NAVY

Montreal, April 8.—Winston Churchill, first lord of the British admiralty, is expected in Madrid, Spain, today, according to a London cable to the Daily Mail. In official Madrid circles it is stated that he is coming to confer with Premier Dato in reference to the projected construction of a second squadron for the Spanish navy.

## SENDING LEADERS TO PROTEST DEPORTATION

British Laborites Delegate Two To Carry Message to South African Premier.

[Canadian Press.]  
Montreal, April 8.—The deportation of the nine South African labor leaders has come up again yesterday, says a London cable to the Daily Mail, when delegates representing two million British workers met to give "a definite expression of the challenge of the democracy of Great Britain to Bothaism." The only notable defection was that of the miners' federation, which is engaged in the big struggle in Yorkshire.

After a long and vigorous discussion of the whole question, it was decided to send Ramsay MacDonald and J. A. Seddon, two of the leaders of the labor parliamentary party, to South Africa to carry to Premier Botha labor's protest against the deportation.

The Daily Herald (syndicated labor) under the heading, "A Final Futility" says: "What useful purpose the deputation can serve we are at a loss to understand."

## "GENERAL" DRUMMOND ATTACKS A COMRADE

Because She Does Not Assist in Rescue During Fight in Court.

London, April 8.—Pandemonium reigned in Marlborough street police Court today, when "General" Mrs. Flora Drummond, the militant suffragette, was brought up again and sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 or as an alternative go to prison for two months on charges of creating a disturbance in Hyde Park during the Unionist "rally" on Saturday.

Mrs. Drummond was so violent that three policemen had to pin her and remove her hatpins before the magistrate found the opportunity, during a pause in the uproar, to pronounce sentence.

## Off To Cells.

The "general" vehemently declared that she would never pay the fine, and was then forcibly removed to the cells. All the time Mrs. Drummond was in court she kept up a fierce struggle with the police and wardens and shrieked denunciations of everyone present. Even a sister militant suffragette who was in court was the victim of an attack, because she did not storm the prisoners' dock and rescue the "general."

## Magistrate Ducked.

Seizing a policeman's metal whistle, Mrs. Drummond flung it at the magistrate's head and he escaped only by a timely duck.

Taking advantage of the diversion, Mrs. Drummond then sprang from the enclosure, but was seized before she got away and was carried back shouting and struggling.

On being led with the struggling mob to the cells, she kept a firm hold of her until she had been sentenced and then dragged her off to the cells.

When Mrs. Drummond had become calmer she was released, as either she or someone else had paid her fine.

## HALF ENGLISH VILLAGE WIPED OUT BY FLAMES

## Disaster Very Serious As All Are Poor—Centenarian Woman Saved by Son.

London, April 8.—(Montreal Daily Telegraph.)—A calamity, the intensity of which is not to be measured by the mere record of damage done and dwellings destroyed, befell the village of Little Chesterford, in the County of Essex, yesterday. Eleven houses, accommodating nearly fifty out of a total population of one hundred, were burned to the ground and the laborers whose homes have thus vanished will feel the blow all the more because they earn only three dollars a week, and cottages in the county are everywhere scarce.

Among those saved was a centenarian woman. Her son, who is seventy-three, was working in a back garden when he saw the cottages at the lower end of the street were on fire, and had only time to help his mother out of bed and into the garden, when the thatched roof of the house collapsed. He put her in a wheel barrow and wheeled her away to safety.

The old woman's greatest apparent regret was that she had not brought away her spectacles.

## CHAMPION MEAT EATERS

Australia and Argentina Lead the United States.

Washington, April 8.—Australia and Argentina are the only two countries, so far as is known, which have a greater per capita consumption of dressed meat than the United States, according to the department of agriculture. "Australia and Argentina," says the statement, "are countries of sparse population and vast herds and flocks; hence meat is exceedingly cheap and native consumption large and probably wasteful."

The per capita consumption of meat for Australia and Argentina is estimated to be about 250 pounds per annum, for the United States 172 pounds in 1909; for Britain slightly under 120 pounds.

## SOME MORE NOISY MILITANTS IN COURT

Belfast, Ireland, April 8.—Militant suffragettes created so much confusion and noise in the police court here today, when Dorothy Evans and Madge Muir, officials of the Belfast branch of the Women's Social and Political Union, were brought up for trial, that the proceedings had to be adjourned. The two women were charged with having in their possession explosives for the purpose of committing a felony.

## CURES TUBERCULOSIS BY ELECTRIC LIGHT

Danish Doctor Claims Good Results From Treatment.

[Canadian Press.]  
London, April 8.—Dr. Reyn, head of the Finlen Light Institute, has made interesting experiments in the treatment of patients suffering from surgical tuberculosis, says the Copenhagen correspondent of the Daily Telegraph.

Electric light was used in cases which had hitherto required the knife, and it is stated, with most satisfactory results.

Describing the treatment, the correspondent says the patient is placed about a yard in front of an ordinary arc lamp, and its rays directed against the affected parts of the body. The irritation lasts, at the beginning of the treatment, fifteen minutes daily, but it is increased gradually until it reaches two and one-half hours.

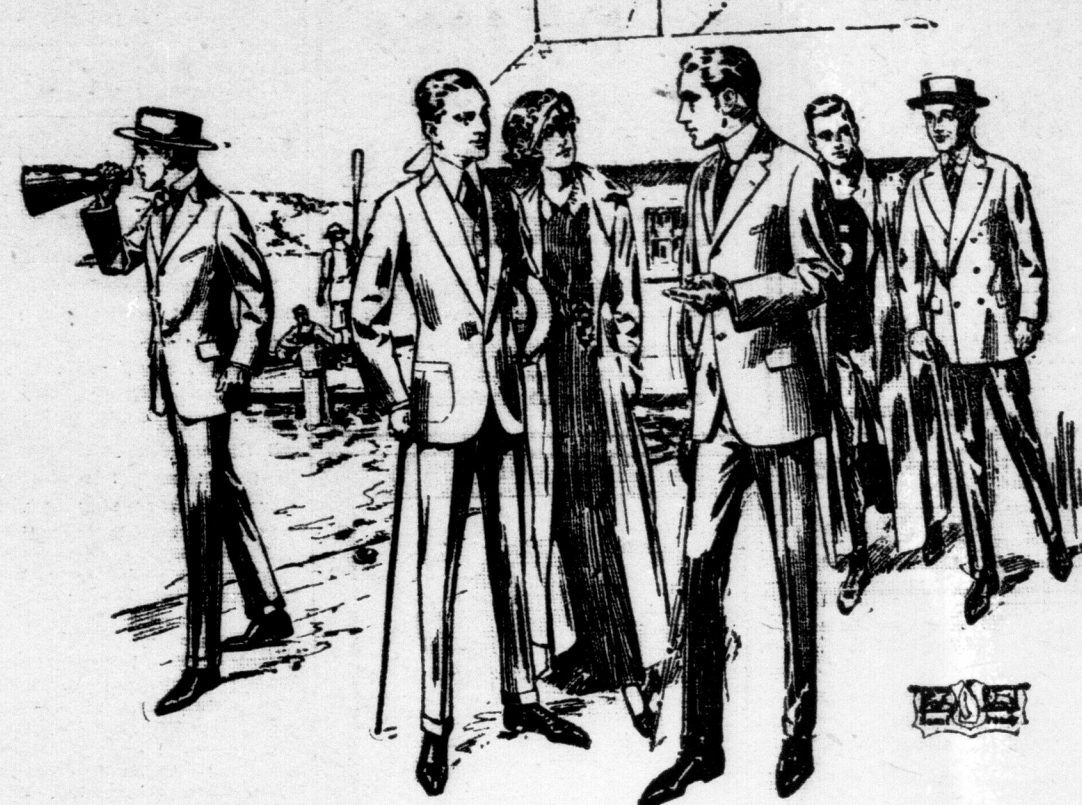
