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GRAPHIC STORIES OF WAR INCIDENTS

Cavalry Charge at Charleroi Proved Disastrous, Especially to Lancers.

GALLANT ACT OF CAPTAIN Grenfell Said To Be Recommended for Victoria Cross For Bravery.

[Canadian Press.] London, Sept. 11.—The Rouen correspondent of the Daily Mail sends a picturesque story of a great cavalry charge at Thuin, a town in Belgium near Charleroi, and the subsequent retreat to Compiègne. The story follows:

"On Monday morning, August 24, after chafing at the long delay, the second British cavalry brigade let loose at the enemy's guns. The Ninth Lancers went into action singing and shouting like schoolboys. For a time all seemed well, few saddles were emptied, and the leaders had charged almost within reach of the enemy's guns, when suddenly the Germans opened a murderous fire from at least twenty concealed machine guns at a range of 150 yards. Result Terrible. The result was shattering, and the Lancers caught the full force of the storm. Lieutenant Vauvieux, a French cavalry officer, was killed instantly. Captain Lequeux, who was the French master of a school in Rouen, was riding by the side of Vauvieux, and had a narrow escape, as his horse was shot from under him. Other officers also fell. "While the bulk of the brigade swerved to the right, the others were hurled forward, and the enemy's machine guns were buried in the grass 30 yards in front of the machine guns, and were made prisoners. Three regiments of the best cavalry of the British army went into the charge and suffered severely. The Eighteenth Hussars and the Fourth Dragoons also suffered, but not to the same extent as the others. "A happy feature of the charge was the gallant conduct of Captain Grenfell, who though twice wounded, called for volunteers and was permitted to taste that joy at the village of Lassigny, which they passed and repassed three times. "On August 12, after the battle of Haelen, Col. Van Damme, commander of a Belgian regiment, was lying on the ground, his horse having been shot. He was unable to move. Several German soldiers found him, and placing their revolvers against his mouth, held his head off. At Bouleaux, the German troops went into battle carrying the Belgian flag. Shot at Running Woman. "On August 10, the German cavalry raided the town of Velen, while the inhabitants slept. One instance of what they did may be cited in the case of a man named Deglimme, whose house was fired and looted. He and his wife were taken from the house half-naked. He was dragged away in one direction, she in another. She was released when two miles away and told to run. When she ran, the German soldiers fired at her, but she escaped the bullets and returned to the site of her ruined home in a pitiable condition. Her husband also was released and fired upon when he ran. He was mortally wounded, next day, on the road outside the town. "Count De Lichterfelde said he had read the statement of a Belgian soldier, a German Emperor, in which it was stated that harsh treatment of Belgians was made necessary in some cases, because of Belgian civilians fired on German soldiers. "I do not see how it is possible for a man to lie so," Count De Lichterfelde said.

THRILLING RESCUE OF OCEANIC CREW. [Canadian Press.] London, Sept. 11.—Capt. Armour, of the Aberdeen Trust, told the story of the rescue of the crew of the white Star liner Oceanic from the Central American coast. "After a long and hard tussle in the nasty sea, we brought ourselves alongside the stricken ship, and ladders were lowered over the side of the ship, down which the crew scrambled and tumbled to the deck of our boat. We got 400 of them and then steamed off—we could hold no more—and deposited them on a larger steamer, which was standing off in the distance, unable to get any closer owing to the reefs on this dangerous coast. "Returned For More. "After transferring our human freight we returned quickly, but cautiously, and took off the remainder, who were similarly transferred to the boat in the offing. "The rescue was attended with great risk on account of a heavy sea and the darkness and the dangerous rocks all about. The captain of the Oceanic was the last to leave his ship. He paid us a high compliment, and thanked us warmly. "DOCTORS SAW NO SIGN OF DUM DUMS. [Canadian Press.] Rotterdam, via London, Sept. 11.—4:15 a.m.—The eight French medical officers, who were captured by the Germans in Namur, but who later were released, and are here on their way back to France by way of England, gave some interesting sidelights on the situation in the field from their standpoint as surgeons. "We were obliged to work with the Germans," one of them said. "Most of the wounded were anxious to return to the front. The first, under Major Caracallan, and the remainder have been drafted to the Divisional Ammunition Column, commanded by Major Leonard. "The British army was not so heavily engaged during the day. There are approximately 1,500,000 men in the allies' fighting line."

FIENDISH ACTS OF GERMAN SOLDIERS

Belgian Commissioner Tells of Some Atrocities Committed on Women and Citizens of Village.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Sept. 11.—A partial list of the alleged German atrocities in Belgium, against which the Belgian King has sent a protest to President Wilson, was made public today by Count Louis De Lichterfelde, secretary of the Belgian commission bearing the protests. The commission reached this city today on its way to Washington. "The Germans, when the Germans entered the village, two uniformed gentlemen attacked the Germans," Count De Lichterfelde said. "In revenge the village was invaded on the night of August 10. Two farms were destroyed; the crops were destroyed or carried away; six houses were burned, and all the men were compelled to hand over their arms. Brains Battered Out. "It was found that none had been discharged recently, and finally the men were separated into three detachments. Two of the detachments disappeared. A third, consisting of eleven men, was driven, at the point of the bayonet, into a ditch, and when they were piled in, the German soldiers set upon them and beat their brains out with the butt ends of their rifles. The eleven battered bodies were found later by Belgian troops. "On August 12, after the battle of Haelen, Col.
