GUELPH POUNDED LABATE AND BEAT LONDON 8 TO 3

Brooklyn Lad Was Hit Hard in Early Stanzas, While
London Was Stopped by Dorbeck — Harkins
Threatened Umpire and Was Banished.

"Naughty" Lee's Guelph boys didn't have the least bit of respect for anything. Joseph La Bate, of Brooklyn, threw up to them yesterday afternoon over in the West London baseball premises. Joseph was out there heaving them over for London, but his efforts were not entirely asphyxiated with success. The way the Guelph boys kept hitting them, particularly in those early chapters of the pastime, was painful, very painful indeed, and it got so the local bugs in the stands hated to see any of Mr. Lee's hitters walk up to the plate.

There was Mr. Brown for instance; the Mr. Brown who centrefields for naughty Knotty Lee. We haven't known Mr. Brown long enough to learn his first name, but we have a suspicion that the name is "Hill-Center." Mr. Centerfield hit him. Right in the first inning, Centrefield Brown started to live up to that middle name. Mr. O'Brien was on second base, by virtue of a pass and a steal, at the time, so that Mr. Brown's first hit caused a real pang. In the third frame, up comes Brown again and right there on second base was Mr. O'Brien. Right on the nose, Mr. Brown hit the ball and Mr. O'Brien counted again. Then there was the seventh inning—but that's getting ahead of our story. There was much that happened in between—much that happened to Joe La Bate and the company he keeps.

Joe Survived Them All.
Perhaps he had better had than the score and give you a clearer idea of what it is all about. The score, dear reader, was 8 to 3, with the "Naughty" Lee boys perched on the big end. When the pastime started the official batteries were Kirley and Harkins for Guelph, and La Bate and Danford for London. Out of that merry quartet, Joe La Bate was the sole survivor when the ninth inning rolled around. The others had departed singly and at intervals. There were times, many times, when it looked

as if Joseph would be forced out of it, too. The London fielders were making too many ankle excursions, and the way those Guelph boys were hitting them was dangerous. Some of the London players might have been wounded. But Joe settled down for a couple of sessions and when he again started throwing the ball up against the Guelph bats, it was too late to apply the derelict. The "dodgy" was done.

Harkins Was Chased.
Johnny Harkins was the first member of the quartet to flitter out of the contest. It was in London's half of the fifth frame that Johnny made his exit. He chased himself out of all further responsibility in that game when he squared up to Umpire Bedford after the latter had called Jack Danford safe at the plate on a close play. Harkins was in a fighting mood and only the interference of the other players prevented him from getting into serious trouble. "Red" Fisher was called in to replace him and the game went on.

Jack Danford was forced to retire in the seventh. Harkins was at bat at the time and a foul tip from his bat hit Danford on one of his throwing digits and rendered it hors-de-combat. Jim Bowden donned the harness then and made his first appearance before local fans behind the plate. Danford's injury may not keep him out of the game long. His finger was dislocated, but not broken, or cut.

The first three innings produced three runs for the visitors, one coming in each inning on good solid hitting. Brown drove in the first run and in the second inning, singles by Hunt, Grives and Harkins produced the second. Brown repeated in the third after Kirley got a single to centre and Murphy followed with a single to left. O'Brien's long fly to left which Eckstein made a beautiful bare-handed catch of, enabled Kirley to score. Isaacs singled to right and Murphy scored. Danford over Danford's head.

London had tied up the game in the third by getting a trio of counters on timely hitting. Danford opened with a single to centre and La Bate sacrificed him to second. Myers shot a single into right and O'Brien pegged to the plate. Danford had stopped at third, so Myers had to take to the base on a sacrifice. Harkins threw to second and Danford started for home. Murphy returned the ball quickly and Harkins fell all over Danford at the plate. Jack had slid under him and Bedford called him safe. Harkins was put out of the game when he rushed at the umpire and threatened him. Myers went to third and scored on Jack's Schaffer's three-cushion drive to right. Lamy scored Schaffer with a single to right.

The Lead Scored Twice in the seventh, hits by Brown and Grives, a wild peg by Whitcraft and a balk by La Bate accounting for them. Harkins' sacrifice fly added another to Murphy's single, errors by La Bate and Hoch and Brown's sacrifice fly.

The locals tried to run wild on the bases in one or two innings, but with little success. Both Lamy and Reidy were nabbed off first and put out in the effort to make second, while Eckstein was caught also, but a bad throw by Kirley enabled him to get to third. In the ninth, Eckstein and Bowden singled with one out and "Doc" Reisinger pinch hit for La Bate. He sent Brown back quite a way to get his long hit. Eckstein's great catch was a feature.

London First Sacker Hurt In Motorcycle Accident

Elmer Hoch's Left Shoulder Pierced by Buggy Shaft
When Horse Plunges in Front of His Machine
—Will Be Out of Game for Weeks.

The London Canadian League team is running in hard luck. Last night, First Baseman Elmer Hoch was injured in a motorcycle accident and today lies in Victoria Hospital with a lacerated shoulder that will keep him out of the game for weeks.

Hoch and Johnny Murphy, the Guelph shortstop, went for a ride on the former's motorcycle. They went out into the country for a couple of miles, and were returning when they met a farmer driving a colt that became frightened at the motorcycle. Just as Hoch tried to steer his machine past the rig, the horse suddenly jumped in front of him and a collision occurred. One of the shafts of the buggy pierced his shoulder and snapped off. The wound was a big one, and no time was lost in getting the injured man into London and to the hospital. Murphy was badly shaken up, but will be able to play in today's game.

At the hospital, Hoch was given an anesthetic while the wound was dressed. Manager Reisinger arrived soon after and announced afterward that it would be several weeks before Hoch would be able to play again, and he might be out all season. It is Hoch's left arm and shoulder that are injured, and as he throws left-handed and bats the same way, it will cripple him considerably. The London club is in a bad way at present, owing to the failure of its pitching staff to deliver. Reisinger will work against Guelph today. "Doc" Reisinger worked on Thursday. The club has no released him, but given him a week or two of rest in order to get into shape. Reisinger will likely sign up another pitcher in a day or so. Another pitcher and Hammond are unfit to work at present and being saved for the Ottawa series next week.
