would have been caught in bed by the tidal wave. As it was it was only the children who were asleep at the time and grown-ups were able to help them from danger.

the residential side of the town. On the other side of the customs house, the moving-picture theatre, an amusement hall and a few houses. On the other side of the town only a store, hotel, office building and some of the mill shops, buildings and residence of the manager are left.

Today the lighting system had been partially restored. The south side of the town is lighted. Squamish, eight miles north of here, is also flooded but damage is not great.
