ROBS JEWELER OF

\$50,000 IN GEMS

New York Salesman Assaulted by Gang in Chicago Hotel.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—Fifty thousand dollars worth of diamonds were stolen today by daring thieves who assaulted Adolph Kunstler, New York jeweler, in the Automat restaurant at 4822 Sheridan road and escaped in the weaving traffic of the uptown boulevard.

This morning Kunstler left his hotel to call on some Chicago customers. He decided first to go to the Automat for breakfast.

Detectives believe the jewel gang had been shadowing Kunstler since his arrival in town. It was almost certain the robbers followed him from the hotel to the restaurant.

They permitted Kunstler to select his breakfast and take a seat at the table. Then the three went up to him.

As Kunstler looked up one of the men clutched his throat. A second struck him over the head with a blackjack. The third reached for Kunstler's inside pocket as Kunstler's hands instinctively went to the place where the wallet of diamonds was carried.

Kunstler fought until dazed and helpless from the choking and beating. With a last desperate effort the third robber twisted the wallet of gems from his hands. The trio fled as spectators hurried forward.

BURY BRANTFORD MURDER VICTIM

BRANTFORD, Sept. 8.—The remains of the late Joe Scharonia, who was found murdered in the Welland Canal last Tuesday morning, were brought to the city last night.

The body was taken in charge by Read & Brown, funeral directors, and this morning was taken to St. Basil's Church, where a short ceremony was held, with Father Cummings officiating. The remains were then taken to Guelph, where burial will take place.

No new developments have arisen in the case, which is being investigated by Provincial Officers Gurnett and Wilmore. The police have very little to work on in their search for the murderer or murderers. The only clue left at the canal was seven shells of .45 calibre, which did not lend any material help to the identity of the murderers.

It is felt, however, the same gangsters are at the back of the affair that instigated the shooting about two months ago, when the deceased and his cousin, Sam Scharonia, were fired at from an automobile on George street, city.

WILL CLOSE ALL BERLIN MOVIES

BERLIN, Sept. 8.—All the moving picture shows in Berlin are to be closed after September 22, in accordance with a decision reached by the Association of Cinema Theatre Owners, owing to the excessive amusement tax.

STATES CHURCH ALONE CAN ACT

Leopold Houle Outlines Delorme's Case Against Suit of Relatives.

Completes Reply To Petition To Have Priest Interdicted.

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.—Because Rev. Adelard Delorme is a priest he is subject solely to ecclesiastical authority and cannot be prosecuted or proceeded against in a civil court in Quebec without special permission.

This is one of the contentions of Leopold Houle in his final outline of the priest's case against the suit begun by relatives to have him interdicted and an executor appointed for his estate.

Mr. Houle is acting on behalf of Delorme and his sisters. Delorme is now in Beauport Asylum, to which place he was committed after a jury had found him insane following his indictment for the murder of his half-brother, Raoul Delorme.

Mr. Houle's complete reply to the petition to have Delorme interdicted follows:

Denies Insanity.

1. A denial that he is insane.

2. That the superintendent at the Beauport Asylum may, if necessary, act as trustee for the Delorme estate, thus removing the necessity of appointing a special trustee.

3. That the prisoner has always administered the estate in a satisfactory and profitable manner.

4. That under the canonical law the defendant (Delorme) in his quality of priest is subject solely to ecclesiastical law.

5. That the interests of the crown would be prejudiced by the appointment of an outside trustee, in view of the indictment actually against the defendant.

6. That the appointment of a trustee would cause damage and inconvenience to the whole Delorme family.

Fails To Specify.

7. That the petitioner has failed to specify in his application for interdiction any of the acts of "imbecility, dementia, fury or insanity" as required by the code.

8. That the petitioner has failed to produce a certificate from the asylum superintendent, in which the defendant (Delorme) is now incarcerated to the effect that the defendant is insane.

9. That the certificate should be obtained from the superintendent within 20 days at the outside.

10. That the interrogatory (examination) of the defendant cannot be recognized under law, owing to the fact that the defendant is at present in an insane asylum.

11. That the conclusions cited in the petition are illegal and null in effect.

12. That the family council is not entitled to be represented by legal counsel in the proceedings, consequently Gustave Monette, representing the family council, should not be permitted to appear in court.

On the foregoing grounds refusal of the position to interdict the defendant is asked.

DO NOT APPROVE RECENT SPEECH OF LLOYD GEORGE

LONDON, England, Sept. 8.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The Indian Legislative Assembly, says Reuter's Simla correspondent, yesterday by a vote of 48 to 34 passed a resolution expressing grave concern as a result of Premier Lloyd George's recent speech in the House of Commons in reference to the future of India, as conflicting with previous declarations of British policy regarding self-government for India and the Indianization of the civil service.

Premier Lloyd George was reported to have said that India would require the guidance of the present civil service organization for an indefinite period. In reply to criticism from India the premier later declared that his speech should not be interpreted as a change of British policy with regard to India.
