Your Backyard Garden

Planting of Onion Crop Should Be Finished Within Next Week.

The time for planting the onion crop has arrived, and provided the weather holds, all backyard gardeners should have sowing of this crop within the next week. The following remarks are offered as a guide to the proper method of planting this crop, whether in the form of seed, Dutch sets, or seedling onions.

The best known and most common method of obtaining a crop of onions is by sowing onion seed out of doors in the location in which it is desired to mature the crop. If this method is followed it is absolutely necessary to have the soil in a very fine state of tilth, as on seed and the seedling onion plants are so small and fine in their structure, that unless they are brought into contact with very small soil particles growth is almost impossible. It is for this reason, then, that the soil must be very carefully prepared. The soil is not in a fine state for growth of onion seed until the top four inches are almost as fine as dust. When this state of tilth has been obtained you can proceed with the sowing.

A good practice is to roll the ground with a lawn roller to pack the lower soil slightly, as onions are shallow feeders, and will arrive at the surface of the soil by a light raking over with the hand rake. Next mark out your rows by scratching very shallow marks with a pointed stick. In these marks drop the onion seed, sowing it twice as thick as you feel it should be. This is to allow for the many seeds which will not germinate. If supply as they are not a good storage onion.

It is useless to compare the three methods, as each has its particular place in both amateur and market gardening. Commercial growers use seed when growing a large crop of onions, while the amateur sets when an early crop of large bunch onions is wanted. Commercial growers never use either sets or seedling onions for large area planting, as the cost of planting would make a big cut in the profits from the crop.

For the backyard gardener a small quantity of sets for early table onions, and considerable sowing of seed for the winter's supply of dry onions is a well-balanced planting. Dutch sets should not be depended upon for the winter supply, as they are not a good storage onion.

to thin them as you weed the crop.

When the seedling onions have grown to the size of lead pencils, thin to four inches apart, and use the thinning as onion onions. Subsequent care of the crop consists in careful and continuous cultivation, and sufficient hand weeding to keep the crop clean.

The growing of onions from Dutch sets is very similar. The main difference is in the fact that sets and tiny seedling onions, grown for the purpose, are planted in the place of seed. It entails rather more work, but is a much surer crop, as the set will commence growing almost immediately after planting, and no thinning is required, the sets having been placed at the four-inch intervals in planting.

If it is difficult or too costly to obtain sets, seedling onions grown in flats under glass may be purchased very reasonably, and are used in the same way as Dutch sets. As the "top" on green seedling onions is out of all proportion to the reduced amount of root that the transplanting leaves, it is necessary to cut back the top growing portion of the set, to two or three inches to balance the root and the top growth.

BOARD MAY AUCTION

FAMOUS SCHOOL SITE

Building and Property Committee Decides To Take Action.

The last chapter in the tragic story of the now famous Dakin street property, purchased one time as a school site and then abandoned may be written in the near future.

The building and property committee of the board of education Wednesday night decided that if the board as a whole is willing the property should be sold at once by auction.

Along with the other property on Grand avenue over which there has been more or less litigation may be disposed of to the highest bidder.

The Dakin street site was purchased for \$300 by the board of education for a new school for Southeast London. For various reasons it was abandoned for another site at Trafalgar and Queen streets. Before this was done, however, a merry battle was fought back and forth between members of the board in which members of the city council and the city solicitor occasionally joined.

The property on Grand avenue was the site of the old Grand Avenue School, which was torn down some years ago, when Tecumseh School was built. It consists of live lots, which are to be sold for building purposes.

A year ago three of the lots were sold by auction to two women, who were sisters-in-law. The husband of one was dissatisfied with the buy, and so both women refused to carry out the sale. They even asked that their deposit be returned to them.

After many vain efforts to secure payment, a compromise has been reached, whereby the purchase of one of the lots will be completed. The four remaining lots will be sold by auction if the board favors the plan.

WOULD HAVE NOVA SCOTIA WITHDRAW FROM DOMINION
