



Resolution To Reduce Debts.

Ottawa, May 27.-Much talk of soldiers' settlement problems and considerable opposition to the government's policy thereon, developed in the house of commons yesterday. when Hon. J. A. Robb had introduced a resolution providing for a credit to the account of any soldier settler whose contract with the gov-ernment had not been terminated, of 40 per cent of the value of all live stock advanced and purchased before Oct. 1, 1920, and 20 per cent of the purchase price of live stock purchased in the succeeding twelve months.
