Aluminum sulphide is obtained from powdering corallite, and it is then decomposed by heating to redness with iron filings. The corallite is first dissolved in water, which drives out the sodium fluoride. The residue, aluminum fluoride, is calcined with calcium sulphide, the result being aluminum sulphide and calcium fluoride.

A public Sunday performance in Lima last month consisted of a terrific fight between two bull dogs and six large cats that were shut up together in a cage. The sport came off in one of the public squares and was witnessed by a large multitude, who enjoyed it, by way of variety, much more than a bull fight. Most of the spectators had been to church in the morning.

The largest empire in the world is that of Great Britain, comprising 8,577,758 square acres, more than a sixth part of the land of the globe, and embracing under its rule nearly a sixth part of the population of the world. In territorial extent the United States ranks third, containing 3,580,242 square miles, including Alaska; in population it ranks fourth with its 50,000,000 people. Russia ranks second, 8,322,040 square miles.

The old African Baptist church in Richmond, Va., has dedicated its new \$30,000 house of worship, the financial management of which has been exceedingly creditable. Thus far about \$24,000 has been paid on it, most of which has come from the weekly contributions of the colored members. Some of them are very poor. Their success in raising \$24,000 shows what can be done by a large number of faithful persons, each one of whom regularly contributes a little.

Among the most remarkable natural shows is that of Eagle's Nest, on the banks of Killarney, in Ireland, which repeats a bugle call until it seems to be sounded from a liquid instrument; and that on the banks of the Rhine, between Singen and Coblenz, which repeats a sound seventeen times. The most remarkable artificial echo known is that in the castle of Simonetta, about two miles from Milan. It is occasioned by the existence of two parallel walls of considerable length. It repeats the report of a pistol sixty times.

The Chinese wall is the largest wall in the world. It was built by the first emperor of the Tsin dynasty, about 220 B. C., as a protection against Parthians. It traverses the northern boundary of China, and is carried over the highest hills, through the deepest valleys, across rivers and every other natural obstacle. Its length is 1,250 miles. Including a parapet of five feet, the total height of the wall is twenty feet, thickness at the base twenty-five feet, and at the top 15 feet. Towers or bastions occur at intervals of about 100 yards.

Dr. Barnardo is one of the most active and successful city missionaries in London. His mission is to the most degraded and he depends on voluntary contributions for the means with which to carry it on. Recently he was in a tight place for lack of funds. A lady who was an entire stranger to him called to make some inquiries about the mission. She expressed herself so well satisfied with what she learned about it, that she asked Dr. Barnardo to accept of a £1000 bank of England note. This he gratefully consented to do. Before he had recovered from the astonishment consequent on the unexpected gift she asked him if he would accept of another just like it. He consented just as gratefully as in the first instance. As she was going away she quietly slipped another into his hand, making altogether £3000, or about \$15,000 in our money. The lady declined to give her name, but seemed to take pleasure in doing good for the love of it, and not for the sake of having her beneficence advertised in the papers.

Canada Larger than the United States. From the Philadelphia Record. It is not so generally known as it might be that the dominion of Canada is a larger country than the United States. When the tide of immigration that sets so strongly toward this country shall have exhausted the receptive capacity of the land it will undoubtedly turn northward. There are millions of acres of arable land in Canada that offer as great inducements to the settler as the lands lying westward of Lake Superior, in Minnesota, Dakota and Montana. It is only within a few years past that the Canadians themselves, owing to stimulus of railroad extension, have been aware of the mineral and agricultural capabilities of the vast territory of the Northwest. They are just beginning to find it out and to bring it to the attention of other people.

An American Description of Lorne and Louise. The governor-general as he appeared to a Chicago reporter, was a "well-made, broad-shouldered, good-looking man, more English than Scotch in his looks, about 35, with the Campbell features, not excepting the red hair, modest in manner, and speaking in a gentle voice, with a decidedly Scotch brogue." The Princess Louise, as seen on the same occasion, is thus described: "She is a well-proportioned, hale woman of 35 or thereabouts. She has the features of her mother, and a modest yet frank demeanor. That she is her mother's daughter there is not the slightest doubt, and among the other ladies she would be identified in an instant. She has a bright intelligent face which lights up pleasantly when she converses."
