He said Ferry had committed a veritable ro itical crime in refusing to make peace upon the basis of that convention, and in declining the Chinese indemnity of 65,000,000 taels. France, Clemenceau said, did wrong in accepting the mediation of England, for the latter's disinterestedness was open to suspicion. He said Bismarck was a most dangerous as afriend. It was necessary to beware lest French dignity should be compromised. Clemenceau insisted that peace with China was still possible, and expressed the belief that Ferry's version of the Chinese terms was inaccurate. [Ferry here protested at being insulted] Clemenceau concluded by saying that it the chambers desired a policy of action it ought to vote sufficient credits to enable the government to declare war now and not postpone the capture of Pekin until after the elections. The faults that have been hitherto committed by isolated persons, if continued, will become the faults of the republican party. [Cheers.]
