The Homestead strike Over.

Telegraphic advices from Homestead last night say that despite the Carnegie workers are not unconditionally and the men are returning to work.

This can indicate only one thing and that is previous to the military intervention men were prevented from working because some form of intimidation was exercised over them. It also indicates that, to a considerable extent, the strike is over.

So long as the strikers could direct against the justice of their cause the contest was watched everywhere with the most intense interest and with strong sympathy for the strikers. But as soon as it becomes apparent that the Carnegie workers are not the only other laborers the ascendancy of the strikers cannot be maintained, the sympathy of the community is transferred from them to the side of the court.

When the armed presence of the law revealed the fact that it was needed opposition to the court ceased.

The spirit of the Homestead strike was defeated as soon as the necessity for troops became evident.

Nat. R. C. - How Attractive the West.

The World's suggestion of a committee of leading citizens on public improvements that will tend to make the city attractive ought to be adopted at once. We believe it is even now underway. If good men take hold of it they ought to be encouraged. Any man who is not willing to live in a city where he is willing to chip in \$10 for the working of the scheme. A paid secretary may be required. We want a well-thought-out scheme of a boulevard drive about the city, an island drive, an island tunnel, a big city hotel, a system to bring more of the world to us, a bridge over the lake to get a share of the interests of others in the Chicago Fair next year, and in other ways to make our city attractive to visitors. Every visitor leaves some money in the town; we ought, therefore, to induce him and his wife to enter our gates.
