

## START ON SEWERS EARLY NEXT YEAR

If Recommendation of Engineer  
Is Adopted.

### ACROSS WELLINGTON BRIDGE

Construction on the High street sewers will be commenced early next spring if the recommendation made by City Engineer Brazier is adopted. He suggests that the ratersayers on High street from the river to Tecumseh avenue and Wellington road from the river to the city limits and on all intersecting streets get up a petition, asking for the work to be undertaken. Then

when these petitions are presented to the Council, that body will ask the engineer to prepare an estimate of the cost and the work will probably be initiated this winter in order that construction may be commenced early next spring.

In this connection it is pointed out that the Council of two years ago passed the by-law authorizing the work to be carried out. Last fall the aldermen wanted to have the work proceed during the winter to provide employment. But it was found this was impossible owing to the nature of the subsoil in that district. It was fully expected it would be undertaken early this year at the latest, but for some reason or other it was laid over.

Mr. Brazier formerly estimated the work would cost \$230,000, but that was two years ago. The cost would be less now. He would revise his estimate in accordance with the cost of labor and materials to-day before placing the situation for the consideration of the Council. It is confidently expected the work will be undertaken next year, as the aldermen are all convinced of the necessity for it.

### WILL MAKE REPORT TO-DAY

Meigs B. Russell Congratulates  
Local Organization

"London has just cause to feel pride in its Chamber of Commerce and in the work that it has done during the past year," stated Meigs B. Russell, field secretary of the American City Bureau, who is in London this week assisting the chamber in the work of closing its year and in recruiting its strength for the coming 12 months.

"While the chamber is in excellent shape it needs to be expanded for two very important reasons. The first is that its work could be greatly augmented by a larger membership and the attendant increased financial capacity to carry on, and the second is that a greater number of interested members would enable it to exert a great deal more influence in the city. While the chamber has amply demonstrated its efficiency and its hardy spirit for the public, which reaps the fruit of its work, to fail to aid in producing these benefits, some are willing to give of their time and money and effort and thought, but the circle of these public-spirited citizens should be widened. United effort is needed to carry on the work as it should be carried on in a city of the size and importance of London."

### AGAINST FAKE STOCKS.

"One activity alone which has been started this year should certainly be carried through to a successful conclusion, and that is the safeguarding the investor against wildcat schemes and fraudulent stock sellers. It has been stated by the financial editor of Saturday Night that between \$20,000,000 and \$40,000,000 are annually thrown away in the province in the purchase of securities which ultimately turn out to be nothing but mere scraps of paper. If the minimum figure of \$20,000,000 is correct and the population of the province is 2,929,054, as the census states, then London, with a population of 60,885, would be squandering upward of \$300,000 a year. The amount in excess of \$300,000 would three or four times over for the Chamber of Commerce alone if it could be saved. This is but one angle of the picture of what the chamber can accomplish if it has strong enough public backing and can carry out its plans.

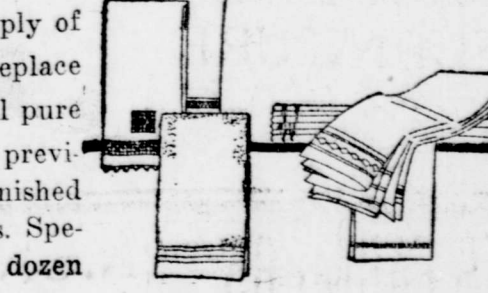

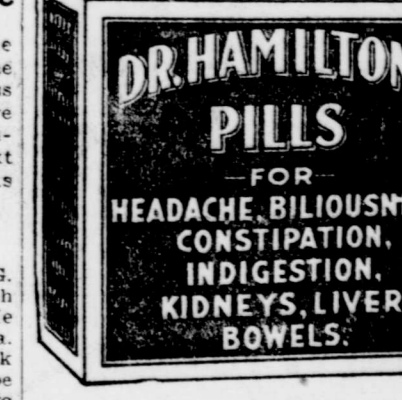
### HON. RODOLPHE MONTY CONFIDENT OF QUEBEC
