Practical Points in Operative Dentistry.

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MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN OF THE ONTARIO DENTAL SOCIETY,—In preparing a paper on Practical Points in Operative Dentistry for your Society, the writer first of all looked over your programme so that he might avoid touching on any subject treated by other essayists.
