> 3. The church demands it. The whole tenor of the church's teaching indicates the need that there is for a special season of self-denial and self-examination in every Christian year. The special services appointed for Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, express clearly and definitely her wishes in this respect. The portion of Holy Scripture as pointed for the epistle is chosen from the Book of the Prophet Joel, and gives ample authority from the Old Testament for such a season, the Gospel gives the Saviour's authority, and along with it a setting forth of the Divine principles upon which Christians are to base their observance of Lent. They are to keep Lent voluntarily, cheerfully, unassumingly,-for God's glory, the good of the church as a body, and the advancement of our own spiritual life.
