He exhorted his hearers to independence in their support of the colleges of the Church, and derided the thought of living on the generosity of the past. Knox charch should support Knox College, if even only for the sake of the name; the people of Toronto, because it is located here and the Prestyterian Clarreh of Canada at large, for the magnificent work which, under Principal Caven, it is doing.
