Heber Bullock, who had seen the bodies on his return from duty at Falkland.

A Mr. Parker belonging to a vessel at Strachan's whatf, was drowned on Sunday night. A young man named Monslield was drowned off one of the wharve at Dartmeuth on Monday morning. And on Wednes by morning a man named Michael Lynch, a muson, was found in the collar of a house in Gerrich street. lying dead, with his face in a frozen pol of voter, and a little deg belonging to him, at the first of the corpse.
