

Questions

The provincial government has advised that work has commenced on all these roads and that the Oiseau lake road has been completed. The agreement requires the province to complete construction of these projects by March 31, 1966, but the planning and scheduling of construction is a provincial responsibility under the agreement.

3. The federal government pays 50 per cent of the costs incurred and submitted by the province as provided by the agreement.

THREATS TO WEST COAST FISHERIES

Question No. 341—Mr. Barnett:

With reference to the statement of the Prime Minister as recorded on page 621 of the House of Commons debates on Tuesday, June 4, 1963, what are the "indications" that Canada's west coast fisheries may soon be threatened?

Mr. Davis: The sentence "There are indications also that Canada's west coast fisheries may soon be threatened" refers to the general great expansion of high seas fishing by many nations of the world, and particularly to activity for some time in the not too distant waters of the Bering sea.
