Question No. 595-Mr. Thomson:

FEDERAL GRANT TO NATIONAL CANCER INSTITUTE

Question No. 618-Mr. Thomson:

- 1. Has the grant to the National Cancer Institute been reduced and, if so, for what reason?
- 2. What are the government's plans for this grant this coming year?

Hon. John C. Munro (Minister of National Health and Welfare): 1. Yes, federal assistance from the National Health Grant to the National Cancer Institute was reduced from \$350,000 for the fiscal year 1969-70 to \$250,000 in 1970-71. The National Health Grant is intended to support short-term projects (applied research, demonstration and training) designed to stimulate and develop improvements in health services. Support for individual projects normally does not exceed a period of three years. This grant is not intended to provide annual blocks of funds in support of continuing activities.

2. The "block grant" to the National Cancer Institute from the National Health Grant will be further reduced in 1971-72 for the reason stated above. However, the N.C.I. or research investigators supported by N.C.I. may submit applications for support on a project basis under the National Health Grant, the Public Health Research Grant, or to the Medical Research Council. Thus, the reduction in assistance from the National Health Grant need not represent a reduction in the level of government fund available for cancer research, but rather re-
