CANADA LABOUR CODE

MEASURE TO AMEND

Mr. Lyle Kristiansen (Kootenay West—Revelstoke) moved for leave to introduce Bill C-276, an act to amend the Canada Labour Code (unjust dismissal).

Mr. Deputy Speaker: Shall the hon. member have leave to introduce the bill?

Some Hon. Members: Agreed.

Mr. Kristiansen: Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to provide that no employer may suspend, discharge or impose any financial or other penalty on a person employed by him, or take any other disciplinary action against such a person by reason of that person having refused to perform an act that he has reasonable cause to believe is prohibited by law.

Essentially, this kind of bill is called whistle blowing legislation. It can be used by employees, whether public

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or private, to ensure that they can act as policemen of the environment or any other law, edict or regulation, federal, provincial or local.

Motion agreed to, bill read the first time and ordered to be printed.
