WESTERN GRAIN CROP—ASSESSMENT OF STORM DAMAGE—GOVERNMENT ACTION

Hon. H.A. Olson: Honourable senators, yesterday, I asked the Leader of the Government if any action had been initiated to assess the damage done to the grain crop in Western Canada.

In reply to that simple question, the minister recited a whole list of programs that were available early this spring. I am happy to say that the Prime Minister was in Saskatchewan yesterday. A newspaper article about his visit states:

After a meeting with Saskatchewan farmers, Mulroney said the federal government may have to put an emergency aid package in place for the province's farmers similar to that given Newfoundland fishermen earlier this summer.

The Prime Minister is quoted as having said:

For me to satisfy the purists and say I can't deal with the problem of the farmers of Saskatchewan because I might offend the sensitivities of some political commentators, this is not really serious.

We will deal with problems that are there, problems that are urgent.

Will the minister be more forthcoming today and tell us whether or not there is to be some sort of program? My question is simple. Is anything being done to assess this situation? Will the minister be as forthcoming as the Prime Minister was and say that something might be done about it? Or will he just say, "If you didn't apply before May, you get nothing," which is what he said yesterday.

Hon. Lowell Murray (Leader of the Government): Honourable senators, with regard to that last comment, let me repeat that those farmers who choose not to have crop insurance make a business decision based on their own long-term production and financial situations.

With regard to the statement of the Prime Minister yesterday, as he indicated, the crop situation is being monitored closely as the harvest progresses.

Senator Olson: That is not what the Prime Minister said. According to the quotation I read, he said that he will put in an emergency aid program, regardless of what the purists have to say. I do not know whether the Honourable Senator Murray is a purist or not.
