SALE OF CUBS NOT TO END THE WAR

Barrow Says It Will Remove Only One Federal Backer Conference Halted.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 12.—The sale of the Chicago Cubs to Weeghman does not break up the Federal League nor does it end the baseball war, today said President Barrow of the International League. The negotiations now under way in Chicago do not account for the Brooklyn Federal nor the Federal in other places. It simply takes away one of the big backers of the Federal, and leaves that league in a position to invade another town if it can find the backers to put up the money.

Weeks of negotiations will have to be gone thru with before any final peace is arranged.
The wards cannot possibly purchase Brooklyn. Ebbets simply will not sell. Nor can they purchase the New York Americans. They will have to go to some other city if they expect to get into the majors.
Not a single Federal representative has attended the meetings of the minors at Omaha.
"Peace efforts on the part of organized ball are all because of the International; not because the big leagues are his body. The sale of the Cubs does not assure that peace which can only come by one or the other being wiped out or eliminated by purchase. There may be a consolidation of interests at Buffalo and Baltimore, but no elimination of the International teams, as President Gilmore of the Federal says there will be. And in any negotiations which are carried on those leagues which are loyal to organized ball will receive the consideration. Not the other fellows."
President Barrow expected to hold a conference in Chicago this morning with San Johnson and Garry Herrmann, but at the last moment was detained in Omaha, and the conference is postponed until Friday morning.
The sale of the Cubs to Weeghman is consummated the war will not be ended thereby.

NOW UP TO WEEGHMAN HE WILL MEET C. TAFT

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Negotiations between Charles Weeghman and August Herrmann, expected to result in the former's acquiring control of the Chicago National, unexpectedly came to a halt tonight after their fifth meeting. Herrmann, who represented the Taft interests in the meetings, sent word to the newspapers that the preliminary stages in the negotiations had been passed, and that final terms must be arranged by Weeghman and Charles P. Taft.

It was generally believed tonight that Charles W. Murphy was blocking the deal, because the proposed deal included moving the club to the Federal League park and abandoning the old park, of which Murphy had purchased a controlling interest. It was said that Murphy is said still to hold 55 per cent. of the Cubs' stock, as collateral for a portion of unpaid purchase price. This, however, was not confirmed by either party to the negotiations, both refusing to give out details. According to Herrmann, there is hardly a chance anything further will develop this month.
With the halt in the Cub deal, hope of immediate baseball peace was deferred, but it was rumored that a truce calculated to prevent competitive bidding in ball players' salaries would be reached.
