'Ye who listen with credulity to the whispers of fancy, and pursue with eagerness the phantoms of hope ; who expect that age will perform the promises of youth, and that the deficiencies of the present day will he supplied by the morrow; attend to the history of Rasselas, Prince of Abyssinia.'
