profession, and justice is well administered.— Controversies among the Catholics, are generally adjusted by the clergy, and litigations are not frequent. Pension, place, and favor are referved for the English and Scotch adventurers, and the fons of Oxford and Cambridge.

A taste for literature, and defire after mental and other improvements is prevalent, and fcience will extend its happy effects among these new settlements.

Mechanics of every kind are eftablished— Ship builders and mill-wrights have produced excellent specimens of their abilities. Most of the mills which are crected upon the larger streams and mill feats, are the labors of ingenuity, and bring profit to the proprietors.

A water voyage through these provinces from Kingston to Montreal is enchanting and entertaining,—cheap and expeditious—while much delay and many impediments, put the patience to the proof, in attempts to pass into the country against the stream.

New objects present every moment to draw the attention: The river,—the broader water

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
