tually, in regard to the fnow and froft. (f) Let them learn from this misfortune, which will bear hard on them, whatever they may receive from us, that the moft durable covering, and the fafeft from fire, will, in the iffue, prove the cheapeft manner of building. It will be an object of great moment to introduce the improvements proposed.

But whilft we give them good advice like friends, let us not act as if we were not their friends, or had no particular regard for them in our capacity as fellowfubjects. As they are conftrained to afk, let us fhew them fuch a mark of our favour, as fhall be of real fervice. This is the way to be beloved and honoured as their fincere friends and benefactors. And we may with the utmost reason hope, that we shall fecure the hearts of these Canadians for many generations to come.

In the mean while, let us feriously reflect, that no fystem of morals, no institute of political precepts, can instruct us fo forcibly as the *law of Christ*, in our duty as citizens and fubjects. Enlightened as we are, yet dif-

(f) These plates are made of an archeen, or 28 inches, fquare, nearly as thick as a new milled shilling, and fold for $z \frac{1}{2}$ rubles a pood, or 11 s. for 36 lb. English. They paint them on both fidgs: but those which are tinned are the most durable and effectual prefervative. They fecure them, by turning one into the other at the edges for near 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch. The inconvemiency of noise from rain, is in a great measure removed by a proper preflure on the infide, in three or four parts, which divides and breaks the found.

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
