

PREMIER BRIAND ATTACKED BY A ROYALIST

His Assailant Was Kicked and Beaten by the Crowd, and Might Have Been Killed, if He Had Not Been Rescued by Republican Guards—The Premier Not Seriously Hurt.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—Imposing national ceremonies in the Tuilleries Garden to-day, in connection with the dedication of a statue erected to the memory of Jules Ferry, the French statesman, were marred by an assault upon Premier Briand, who, while walking with President Fallieres, was struck twice in the face by a Royalist...

The incident occurred at the end of the exercises, which were attended by thousands. President Fallieres, B. Briand and other ministers were walking toward the gateway, when a man broke through the Republican guards that lined the road, leaped to the Premier's side, and, raising his clenched fists high in the air, brought them with full force upon the premier's face. M. Briand reeled, but did not fall. As friends rushed up to assist him, he cried: "I am all right; we must protect my assailant."

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DEATH OF TOLSTOI PASSED BEYOND

Death Came Peacefully Early Sunday Morning to the Greatest Russian Writer of Modern Times—The Countess Was With Him When the End Came.

"Every man ought to do enough work each day to pay for the food he eats and the clothes he wears. Unless he does that, he is sponging and living on the labor of other people, and thus doing an injustice to his fellow men. Some days I mow, on others I pick berries or dig in the garden, pick berries or apples, or like Gladstone, fell a tree. I live simply, make my own boots, and if my women would let me, would also make all my own clothes. I do not have to work for money, and so I find plenty of time to study and write. My only complaint is that I may prove too short to enable me to finish all I wish to do."

ASTAPOVA, Russia, Nov. 20.—Count Leo Tolstoi died peacefully this morning. Countess Tolstoi was at his side when the end came. It was recognized long before that his case was hopeless, and at 5 o'clock in the morning, after the countess had been summoned and the other members of the family had gathered in an adjoining room, the physicians issued a bulletin, announcing that the activity of the heart had almost ceased, and that Tolstoi's condition was extremely dangerous. Severe of the physicians were greatly overcome by the approaching death of Russia's greatest writer.

His heart beat its last apparently without a clear moment to enable him to say farewell, or cast a forgiving look upon his wife and children. The countess all day long was unceasing in her piteous importuning of a doctor after another to gain entrance to where Tolstoi lay. Dr. Tchurovsky promised that he would announce her presence to Tolstoi at a favorable opportunity, but just after a two hours' sleep. The members of the family were hurriedly summoned. The condition of the patient, however, was so grave that he required sleep again by injections of morphine, as the only means of deferring the end. The family were then admitted for a few moments to the bedside.

The Family With Him at End. Another attack occurred about three o'clock, and the family gathered again. The countess was with difficulty prevailed upon to retire. Later, when the end came, in addition to the countess, four sons and three daughters were present. Tolstoi, accompanied only by Dr. Makovetsky, left his home at the Polyana, for the purpose of ending his days in the solitude to which he more and more inclined during his latter years. His pilgrimage led him to the monastery at Shamardine, in the province of Kaluga, where his sister Marie, who is a nun in the cloister.

Learning that his retreat had been discovered, he insisted upon proceeding on his journey to the Caucasus, where he hoped to spend his last days, close to the Black Sea. But during the long road journey he was overtaken with the cold, and Dr. Makovetsky was compelled to have him transferred to the flag station at Astapova, where he was made as comfortable as possible in the rude wooden buildings.

For five days he had lain there, suffering first from bronchitis, and later from inflammation of the lungs. Specialists were called from Moscow and other places, but notwithstanding their utmost efforts, the heart of the great Russian responded but feebly to the restoratives and stimulants administered.

Failed to Recognize Countess. Countess Tolstoi was admitted to the sick room for the first time last night, but her husband morning hours awoke her. She had hastened to the bedside, when she learned several days ago that his illness was serious, but the physicians had deemed it advisable that she be kept away from the countess, fearing that her presence might cause the patient emotion. Other members of the family were from time to time admitted to the presence of their father, and his daughter Alexandra has been in constant attendance.

Crowd Waited Breathless. The crowd that gathered around the hut where Leo Tolstoi lay dying in the early Sunday morning hours awaited breathlessly the verdict of Dr. Tchurovsky and Dr. Usoff, two of the leading heart specialists of Moscow, who had been hurriedly called into consultation. The former had carried Tolstoi safely through a similar crisis in 1901 in Crimea, and the hopes of the people rested on him.

The examination was brief, lasting less than half an hour. Tolstoi failed to recognize either of the physicians, and asked: "Who are these strangers?" "Who are you?" he asked. "What fine name!" he informed, he said: "What through the heart-breaking night, a motley crowd, made up of most diverse elements imaginable, pressed around the low hut. There were distant relatives of the aged author, Tolstonians, villagers, and many churchmen, among them the Abbots Varsovolon, who did not lose hope until the end, of seeing the old man, and extending to him olive branches in behalf of the countess. All alike stood spellbound, knowing that a matchless personality was departing, as the Sunday dawn dispelled
