To Raise \$20,000,000 For Naval Purposes?

WINNIPEG, Oct. 2 .- (Can. Press.)-The Free Press quotes a man in the confidence of the Roblin Government, which it says is acquainted with Mr. Borden's plans, as stating that the maval proposals to be presented to par-liament shortly will consist primarily of an act authorizing the government to raise twenty million dollars for naval purposes, not all at once, but as required. Part of the money will be applied to building one if not two Dread-noughts, in Canada, if possible. The Free Press says an English shipbuilding concern will locate a plant in Hal-ifax if assured of sufficient government

It also understands that the government will prohibit the export from Canada of nickel, except to Britain.
