Richard Hard Died in Hospital From Injuries Received While Installing New

Apparatus.

Richard Hard, who boarded on Keele street in Ward 7 and worked for the Standard Plunger Co. of New York, was crushed so badly yesterday afternoon while installing a new elevator for the Robert Simpson Co. that he died in St. Michael's Hospital a few

minutes before 7 o'clock.
William A. Ross of 93 Gould street, William A. Ross of 93 Gould street, who was near at hand when the accident occurred, gave The World the particulars late last night. Hard, he said, was working on the top of the elevator at the basement of the store when in some unknown manner it began to ascend. As it went up the shaft the boards he was sitting on bestaft the boards he was sitting on beshaft the boards he was sitting on began to catch and it is thought that he attempted to open the doors on the third floor in order to escape. He had not time to get out, however, and was crushed against the glass doors, after which he fell thru the shaft, three floors, to the basement, landing on his right side.

Hard was conscious until he passed way, but was too weak to tell of his away, but was too weak to tell of his accident. Six of his ribs were broken, his right lung was lacerated and besides fractures of the elbow and knee he had two deep scalp wounds. His home is in Australia, where live his wife and two children

wife and two children. This is about the first accident which has occurred in the Simpson store since the big building operations of the

ompany began. Constable Hobson, who is on traffic duty at the corner of Yonge and Queen streets, heard of the accident and went to the foreman of the work, in order to get particulars. Not being acquaintwills, the foreman, retused to give any information. Hobson met Patrol Gergt. Craig on Yonge street, and the two officers went to St. Michael's Hospital, only to find that Hard was dead Chief Coroner Johnson was notified and an inquest will be held.
