## DEFENDS BORDEN BEING OVERSEAS

J. W. Dafee, Back From Paris, Says Canada's Delegates Have Real Power.

Ottawa, March 23.—Mr. John W. Dafee, editor of The Winnipeg Free Press, who has returned to Canada from Paris, where he has been since the commencement of the peace negotiations, arrived in the capital yesterday. When questioned in regard to the necessity for the presence of Sir Robert Borden at the peace conference, he said: "Criticism of the presence of Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues in Paris—of which there have been a good deal in Canada—must be based upon a reluctance to face the realities of the situation. Those who take this view are willing apparently to contract Canada out of the society of nations, so far as having anything to say about the future international order of the world is concerned. There is no domestic question that can be weighed in the same balance with the issues that await settlement at Paris; and the premier of Canada, in my opinion, is precisely where he should be, when he is in Paris as the chief Canadian representative."

**Anxious to Return.**  
"Sir Robert Borden is anxious to return to Canada at the earliest possible moment, and there is a possibility that he and Mr. Doherty will return to Canada in about a month's time, leaving Sir Geo. Foster and Mr. Sifton in charge as the Canadian plenipotentiaries. It is suggested in Canada that our delegates have no real power in Paris, and that they are there only for the look of the thing. This is not correct. The dominions have a real influence in the secret councils of controlling body which none of the secondary powers—not even Belgium or Serbia or Rumania—enjoy. British policy in the council of ten is the subject of constant consideration by the empire delegations, which meet in conference two or three times a week and sometimes daily. It would be quite accurate to say that in these meetings Sir Robert Borden, General Borden and Mr. Hughes meet British ministers on terms of entire equality, and their views receive respectful consideration."

## SECOND VICTORY FOR OTTAWA TEAM

Rushed in Three Goals in Ten Minutes on Vancouver.

Vancouver, B. C., March 22.—Catching the Vancouver team off color the first ten minutes of the game, the Ottawas skated the home team off their feet and ran in three goals, more than enough to win the first game of the series the two clubs are staging under the world's series conditions at the local arena last night. For the other 30 minutes of the contest the two teams played even, each getting a goal. Outside of the first half of the first period the game was fairly fast and the 4,000 fans who attended were well pleased with the work of the senators, whom they had not seen for four years.

Judging from the night's play, Ottawa looks like the winners of the series, the Vancouver millionaires said after the game that they would beat the Senators Monday night, when the second game takes place. If the Ottawa team win Monday night, the series will be finished. If the Millionaires fulfil their promise it will be left up to it goes over the two games the players get nothing for their labors after that.

The Millionaires were decidedly off color at the opening stage of last night's game, and even after that they did not play up to their usual form, with the possible exception of Lehman, Hughes and Taylor, all of whom worked hard and effectively, but the breaks were against them when they got within range of the Ottawa goal.

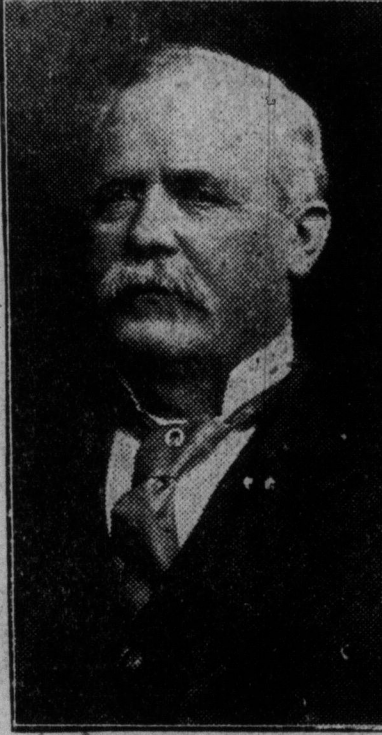

Hamilton, March 23.—Adam Crossman passed away at 243 North Caroline street today. He was an employee of the Garthshore-Thomson Foundry Co. for thirty-eight years and was 67 years old. His wife and five sons and three daughters survive.

## SENATOR TAYLOR DANGEROUSLY ILL

Paralysis Seizes Veteran Statesmen and Conservative Ex-Whip.

Ottawa, March 23.—Hon. Geo. Taylor, of Gananoque, member of the senate since 1911 for the district of Leeds, eastern Ontario, and for 25 years previously whip of the Conservative party, is dangerously ill as the result of a stroke of paralysis and is not expected to recover. Senator Taylor was stricken on Saturday and has not since regained consciousness. Senator Taylor was born on March 31, 1840, and is therefore, almost 79 years of age. During the long period he was whip of the Conservative party he was one of the best known figures in the house of commons and enjoyed the confidence of Sir John Macdonald and the several Conservative prime ministers who succeeded him before the Liberals came to power in 1896. Senator Taylor continued in his post as opposition whip under Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. R. L. Borden throughout the greater part of the fifteen-year period of the Laurier government, was in power. While always a strong party man he commanded the respect and warm personal friendship of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier and other Liberal leaders in the house. His retirement from the commons to the upper chamber was due to the circumstances that after the general election of 1911 he resigned his seat for the constituency of Leeds to provide a seat for Hon. W. T. White, now Sir Tiba. White, who has been named minister of finance by Sir Robert Borden.

## ENTENTE INSISTS ON DANZIG LANDING

London, March 23.—General Nudant, representing Marshal Foch, at a meeting of the armistice commission Wednesday, announced that the entente had declined the German proposal that Polish troops be landed at Koeningberg, Memel and Libau, instead of Danzig, according to a German government wireless despatch received here tonight.

General Nudant said that the international commission at Warsaw had been instructed to make all preparations for the landing of the troops at Danzig. For this purpose, the message says, the German government was requested to grant the members of the commission the necessary liberty to travel.

## SARNIA MASONIC TEMPLE.

Sarnia, March 23.—The members of the local Masonic order have unanimously decided to purchase the Imperial building on the Market Square to be used as a temple. The figure quoted is \$25,000. As a result of the decision a new company will be organized to be known as the Sarnia Masonic Co. and capitalized at \$100,000.

**MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR LEWIS DEAD**

Westminster Presbyterians Mourn Loss of Two Hundred Seamen.

In commemoration at the 200 British gallies who lost their lives when H. M. S. Iolande dashed itself on the rocky coast of the Isle of Lewis, while trying to land for their annual leave, last New Year's day, there was a special memorial service held in the Westminster Presbyterian Church yesterday, over which Rev. Dr. John Neil, D.D., presided.

More than 400 Highlanders from around the Isle of Lewis turned out to the service, and Dr. Neil and the Boys' Naval Brigade which turned out with bands and full equipment to honor their dead Scottish men of the sea, welcomed them.

In a very short sermon, Dr. Neil told of the wonderful work of the British navy during the war, and of the many good men who had been recruited to it from the Herbrides group. Of the available male population of this little island there had not been one conscript, when the call for compulsory service went out. Every one of the men from Lewis had enlisted long before.

Rev. F. A. MacLennan gave an address in Gaelic, and spoke of the terrible tragedy which had occasioned so much sorrow on last New Year's Day.

Rev. Alfred Hall, D.D., senior chaplain to the Royal Naval and Merchant Marine Institutes, gave a brief address, and the service closed with the playing of the Dead March, while the naval cadets marched slowly up the aisles, carrying naval and other flags to the time of the slow dirge.
