

## MINES AND MINING STOCKS

## Progress of Many Kootenay Properties.

Mr. Ross of Fox & Ross talks of the prospects in the Trail Creek, Slovan, Boundary Creek and other districts of British Columbia. Some interesting notes.

Mr. J. Hugo Ross of the firm of Fox & Ross, mining brokers, has just returned from the Kootenays, and reports the prospects there as most encouraging.

He visited the Le Roi, whose shipments are now averaging between four and five hundred tons per day, being an increase of almost 100 per cent. on the shipments of a year ago.

The War Eagle shaft frame has now been completed, and in the near future a large increase in shipments can be expected. Iron works are erecting a compressor plant capable of running five drills, and it is expected the company will double shipments at a very early date. This district property is reported to carry the richest values in the camp, and during the month of September paid, over all expenses, \$14,000 on small shipments. If the present litigation were not on it would undoubtedly be paying regular dividends, and it will do so as soon as the present law suit is settled one way or another.

Virginia at present is looking exceedingly well, it being developed in a thorough manner, and holders of these shares may rest assured that the property is indeed a good one. It is quite a favorite in Rossland, where a lot of the stock is held by prominent business men who purchase up at high as \$50 to \$60, and are not at all frightened at the present slump as they know the merits of the property and will stand by it.

It is to be regretted that the Monte Cristo Con has closed down, pending an expert's examination of the property, which is announced will take place at a very early date. Holders of Monte Cristo may rest assured that the insiders are willing to sell this property through. They have not sold any of their holdings.

The Big Three Company are putting in a five-drill electrical compressor on the Massey, which is located exceedingly well. It adjoins the Columbia and Kootenay, which recently struck 27 feet of solid ore, running from \$80 to \$100 to the last. It is expected a trial shipment of 1000 tons will be made shortly of this high grade ore. Commander has struck some very good ore in the bottom of the shaft, and as this property carries about the highest copper values in the camp it is looked upon as a very promising property, which at an early date considerable will be heard.

The White Bear mine is being worked in the most conscientious manner, and is undoubtedly one of the Le Roi veins. Giant and Novelty are both looking well, and are being developed for all they are worth. The reorganization of R. E. Lee, Home-stake and Gopher is hailed with delight among the holders of South Bell properties, and it is expected that these companies have considerable money in the treasury, that they will strike some promising ore. From all accounts these properties justify these expectations.

The Deer Park machinery is working in first-class order. This property is a great favorite among Rossland investors. The Grand Prize Company has reorganized, and has commenced operations on what is undoubtedly the Deer Park mine. Holders of this stock may rest assured the company are working on the property in a thoroughly conscientious manner.

It is expected work will be resumed on the Iron Colt very shortly, and as this property adjoins the Columbia and Kootenay it is thought some rich ore will be encountered. The Iron Horse Company, also on the same lead, have reorganized and commenced further development work, and while they are not down any great depth still have struck some very nice looking ore. With depth this will undoubtedly improve.

The Rossland Red Mountain has reorganized with a strong eastern directorate, and will commence work at an early date, while Alberta is now at work, and from all accounts Evening Star is looking up exceedingly well.

Jumbo is the making of a great mine, while the Number One, adjoining the War Eagle, and owned by the B. A. Corporation, is also looking extremely well, as is also the Jade, which is owned by the same company. It is expected the Germania, owned by the Montreal Gold Fields syndicate, will start at an early date strike Number One vein.

The Canadian Gold Fields syndicate is operating Sunset No. 2, which is, from all accounts, a good property, and is expected to make further shipments before the end of the year.

Reorganization has taken place among a great many of the companies, who have now sufficient funds to develop their various properties. This is extremely gratifying to the shareholders, who have been waiting for some definite information, and it is thought before the spring several more shipments will be added to the list. If the shareholders in the various companies will only exercise patience they will be rewarded, as it takes some time to develop properties. The Rossland camp has demonstrated its capability of yielding what is required. And while all the properties cannot become shippers, still it may be said that a great many in which eastern people are interested will prove big investments to the owners.

The Boundary Creek district is at the present time looking extremely well, and will be the scene of great activity during the coming spring. The fact is being demonstrated the fact that this is one of the first-class properties, which will be popular investments at an early date. ## WERE TIRRED OF LIVING

## And When Rescued Would Give No Other Reason for Their Attempted Suicide.

Cleveland, O., Oct. 31.—A desperate attempt to commit suicide was made early to-day by the Laurels, aged 22, No. 340 Lake-street, and J. E. Cluckner, aged 32, of No. 26 Case-avenue. The couple walked out to the end of the dock of the Cleveland Yacht Club, the foot of Erie-street, and tied themselves together with strips torn from a bed sheet. They then jumped into the lake.

Two Lake Shore Railroad detectives were in the vicinity and witnessed the act. They at once ran down and dived into the icy water after the couple. The man and woman had already sunk several times, but were finally rescued after a long struggle on the part of the detectives. Both were taken to a hospital. Cluckner is pronounced dead. Cleveland and Pittsburgh roads. Beyond saying that they were tired of living, the couple would give no reason for their attempted suicide.

## SAILORS KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

## Ran Off the Track West of Fort Williams.

Montreal, Que., Oct. 31.—News has just reached here of the wreck of the special train which left Halifax on Thursday last, for Vancouver, with 123 marines and 12 officers for the ships of the British North Pacific fleet at Esquimaux. The train ran off the track near Margaret Station, west of Fort Williams, and is a complete wreck.

Two sailors, Wm. McNeil and Frank Freckney, able seamen of the training ship Agincourt, were killed, and Samuel Harrison, a stoker, of Portsmouth, and Thomas Burns of Edinburgh, were seriously injured. Samuel Smith of Papineauville, Que., was fatally injured.

Fell From the Bridge. Montreal, Que., Oct. 31.—William Warnock of Gravenhurst, Ont., who was working on the Grand Trunk Railway bridge at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, fell 30 feet to the rocks below and was instantly killed; verdict, accidental death.

## LONDON MAN KILLED.

St. Ignace, Mich., Oct. 31.—Assistant Yardmaster John Marshall of the Southern Railway fell from the top of a box car in the yard here Saturday evening and broke his neck. He leaves a widow. His parents live in London, Ont.

## SANITARY CONDITIONS BAD.

## Camps Occupied by Spaniards Should Be Better Kept.

Havana, Oct. 31.—Major Almy and Captain Page have returned here from Cienfuegos. They report the sanitary conditions there are bad, especially at the Spanish camps occupied by the Spanish soldiers. The American officers advise that these places be burned down, as they are infected with yellow fever, and other disease germs have been found.

The reports of skirmishes between the Spaniards and Cubans are incorrect. There have been no hostilities between them since.

## ICE ON THE YUKON

## And Many Steamers Are Stuck on the Sandbars.

San Francisco, Oct. 31.—Ice was making on the Yukon, and there was thin ice at Dutch harbor, when the Portland sailed on Oct. 11. At least a dozen river steamers are stuck on sand bars in the Yukon and all will probably be lost. The Dawson City is a total wreck. The Herman and Tacoma are aground, and the other boats are in such perilous positions that when the ice breaks up they may go to pieces.

All the treasure on the steamer Portland was one box of gold dust and nuggets consigned to the Alaska Commercial Company. Its value was not made known, but it is not believed to exceed \$10,000. Several returning miners were on the vessel, but they carried their wealth in the form of drafts, and were reticent regarding the amount.

## POWDER MILL DEMOLISHED.

## Danger Signal Was Given and Men Escaped in Time.

South Acton, Mass., Oct. 31.—The powder house of the New York and New England Titanic Smokeless Powder Company was demolished by an explosion to-day. There were twenty men employed in the building, all of whom escaped in safety with the exception of two who were slightly injured in the rush to get out. The engineer noticed that something appeared to be wrong with the machinery and he shut off steam and gave the danger signal in time to prevent loss of life.
