I have fur-ther to say that the press comments on some remarks made by his honor at a recent public dinner at Toronto seem to imply that the Lieut.-Governor differ-ed in opinion from Sir Charles Tupper upon questions arising out of incidents connected with retirement of late Gov-ernment from office. Nothing could be further from his thoughts. Subject was not even in his mind. No allusion to, and still less any criticism of Sir Charles was intended.
