PLEASANT GATHERINGS GALORE

Latest Happenings at Toronto Junction, West and in the Eastern District.

Toronto Junction, June 27.—(Special.)—Mr. J. Toombs was fined \$1 and costs by Police Magistrate Ellis at this morning's Police Court for harboring a dog without a license. In defence, it was held that the dog belonged to Mr. Johnston of Palmerston-avenue, Toronto, and that it followed a boy living with Mr. Toombs, who had rooms with Mr. Love.

The police are strictly enforcing the by-law prohibiting the erection of bar-wire fences, and Mr. Barker was this morning charged with violating the by-law.

Mr. Webster appeared for Mr. Mitchell and said that only the top wire of the fence was barbed, and this was necessary to keep boys out of the orchard. The Magistrate, however, decided that a board would have to be put over the bar-wire, or else it would have to be removed. A week was given, in which the change is to be effected.

Mians of North Toronto was given a month in which to dispose of his business, and Frank Addison of the Park Hotel, Inconceivable, was given a month's extension of time in which to complete arrangements for other premises.

A very successful garden party was this evening held in connection with St. Mark's Church, on the lawn of Mayor L. Laughton.

Woodbridge, June 27.—(Special.)—The directors of the West York and Vaughan Agricultural Society met at the Inkerman House, with the president, G. F. Wallace in the chair, and a full attendance of officers. The prize list was revised and judges appointed. It was decided to hold the fair on Oct. 17 and 18.

Weston, June 27.—(Special.)—David Boun-tree, Jr., of the Weston Trading Company was thrown from a horse this afternoon and fell on the back of his head with great force. He lay unconscious for three hours, but tonight regained partial consciousness. He is still in a critical condition.

Troops Had to Fire.

Saragossa, Spain, June 27.—Many people were injured during the rioting here yesterday.

Seventeen persons received dangerous wounds. The troops were obliged to fire on the people. Martial law has been declared at Valencia and fighting has occurred at Grenada, where the troops charged and wounded several persons. Anti-budget demonstrations have also occurred at Burgos, Toledo and Logrona.</
