AMERICANS READING WHERE THEY HAVE NOT SOWN.

Great Britain is by far the most important customer of the United States. The United Kingdom buys 60 per cent. of the products which the American farmer sends abroad. During the last fiscal year Great Britain purchased from the United States \$75,000,000, or 70 per cent. of the 20 leading staples than all the rest of Europe combined. An American consular agent, writing to his Government from Germany, observes that cordial relations with Great Britain will carry the United States many a milestone on the way to profitable trade with the British colonies. The United States, he says, has more to look for from trade with the British colonies than from any other countries. American bridge builders are busy in India and Egypt. American steel rails and machinery are making a name for themselves in South Africa. "British enterprise and stability," the writer continues, "in all these countries means increased opportunities and markets for our manufacturers. The more one becomes familiar with the Continent of Europe the more one is satisfied that no lasting results can be obtained here by manufactured articles. The amount of labor spent in trying to secure markets in France, Germany and other European countries will have three and four-fold results in Africa, Siberia, China and Australia. We have thousands of skilled workmen who are dependent for their existence upon the sale of our overproduction. England is our best customer for our production in food stuffs. The British colonies present the greatest field for our manufactured products."

We are building up a great Empire at the cost of billions of money and the sacrifice of thousands of human lives. But other nations are preparing to reap the bigger part of the trade that will be developed by federation and the extension of the Empire. While Great Britain is fully occupied in prosecuting the war in South Africa, United States manufacturers are exploiting the country and making arrangements to get in on the ground in advance of any other nation, including ourselves. Under our suicidal trade policy we offer our goods to outside nations to get the advantage and enjoy a preference in our own Empire. While we are fighting the battles and making trade possible, the United States is sending its travelers to secure the trade. It is surely time Great Britain went out of the philanthropy business. The open door policy is all right with countries like China, which do not belong to the Empire, but a policy of limited exclusion should be put in force against all foreign countries looking to do business in Great Britain and its colonies. We are building an Empire, which the United States is overrunning with its travelers. We see the seed. Others reap the harvest. Wouldn't it be more sensible on our part to put up a fence and keep the intruders out of territories that rightly belong to us?
