tion was over.MACKENZIE IN GREAT LUCK
OPINION OF LAND EXPERTSNo One Seems Able to Comprehend
Just How Assessor Hutton Figured
Out His Valuation.The success of the dip into legisla-
tion taken by William Mackenzie seem-
ingly has had the effect of making
other large ratepayers in the Avenue
road district, lately annexed, chafe un-
der assessment levied upon their re-
spective properties.Due to feeling ap-
parently to that Assessor Hutton of
Hamilton, in fixing the assessable
value of "improvements" at \$250,000, placed
an absurdly low estimate upon the
Mackenzie domain, and that other
ratepayers, who have large stakes in
the district, are called upon to contribute to the city's
running expenses at a proportionately
heavy rate. Out of this assessment
there looks to be a likelihood of more
work for the committee of the legisla-
ture next session in dealing with the
applications of property owners who
would buck the ten-year agreement
under which the district was taken in.Mr. Mackenzie's move can be seen
to have been a good business stroke,
when it is resolved into a matter of
dollars and cents. By the terms of
annexation, the Mackenzie assess-
ment would have been fixed at
\$250,000, the amount fixed by the
York County council, with \$400,000
for added improvements, or \$750,000
in all. At the 19-mill rate, he would
therefore, under the present assess-
ment, pay \$18,750, as against the
\$10,000 paid to the county on the 10-
mill basis. The cut to \$250,000 is exclu-
sive of the \$400,000 which assessment
and subsequent ratings for addi-
tions there can be no appeal, but
it is stated that Mackenzie has been
hand over only \$750,000, being con-
siderably less than half, or a yearly
saving of \$750. The city having agreed
to the arbitration, there can be no recourse.

Come From Comparison.

The difficulty was reached when the
committee listened to Mr. Laidlaw's
argument, that the Mackenzie assess-
ment was relatively high. Compared
with the assessment of the Macdonald
and Kerr properties, the assessment
of \$70,000 on the Mackenzie house and
grounds may have been too high; but
this was no concern of the provincial
government, and if the district had
been annexed without the fixed as-
sessment arrangement, the council
could have depended on the fact that
the Mackenzie properties were not
overvalued. Mr. Laidlaw contended
that, compared with the Macdonald
and Kerr properties, the Mackenzie
assessment was relatively high. The
Mackenzie assessment was \$250,000,
the Macdonald assessment was \$220,000,
and that of Senator Kerr's property
\$100,000. These figures are regar-
ded as extremely low.

What Might Have Been.

When the bill was before the com-
mittee of the legislature, Mr. Mac-
kenzie offered to waive his objections
to the assessment, if the committee
would fix it at \$400,000. The city objected
and held out for \$450,000, with the re-
sult that the Mackenzie assessment

To Cut Out Trade Is Latest
Move of Bakers.To carry the war into Africa—this,

intends to do. For five weeks the
longest period the local union has ever
been in its strike records, spent in
