Carelessness That Should Be Remedied.

At the Board of Health last night, Prof. James H. Bowman complained strongly of lax enforcement of the regulations with respect to scarlet fever. According to his statement, many city physicians are remiss in reporting these cases, and are therefore contributory to a dangerous state of affairs. We trust the number of practitioners who deserve this censure is not large. The majority doubtless adhere to the rules and are glad to cooperate with the Board of Health in every possible way. At the same time, Prof. Bowman has done a public service by directing attention to a grave question. A great deal of carelessness is often allowed in connection with scarlet fever and other contagious diseases, but the physicians are not the most culpable parties. In scarlet fever cases, especially, the parents and householders are chiefly to blame. It often happens that a child in the first stages of the ailment continues going to school, and exposing others to the infection, before a doctor is called in. The parents either ignore the child's condition, or mistake the symptoms for a cold. It behooves parents to be very watchful. The approach of scarlet fever is marked by feverishness. sore throat, and perhaps a little sickness of the stomach. The light rash

London, June 1 .-- The British Medical Journal says it has the best authority for stating that the alarmist reports in regard to Queen Victoria's eyesight are erroneous, and the rumors of a contemplated operation on her Majesty's eyes are mere invention.

DOINGS AT THE HAGUE. The special dispatch from The Hague to the morning papers agree that the American scheme meets with general favor as being eminently practical. Sir Julian Pauncefote, the head of the British legation, has modified the British proposal, and now suggests that the administrative council should not be international, but should be ap-pointed by the government of the country where the permanent court assembles. According to the correspondent of the Daily News the arbitration committee has unanimously recommended the American scheme to the

conference The Daily Chronicle, in an editorial on the American scheme says: "It is scarcely conceivable that European states, at any rate, would allow three judges to decide vital questions for them, without appeal to a fresh tribunal or to arms."

SENSATIONAL REVELATIONS. The sensational revelations brought out in the trial of the action against the proprietors of the Nellfield cemetery, for alleged interference with a grave in which the plaintiff claimed right of burial, resulted in an action against Wm. Coutts, the superintendent of the cemetery, which is now before the public. A former assistant in the cemetery testified that upon one occasion, when he was working in the strangers' burying ground, he unearthed a box and asked the superintendent what he would do with it. "Oh," replied the superintendent, "she must come up." The body was taken up and placed in a barrow, and of a grave, into which the contents of the barrow was emptied. The coffin was burned. It was a common thing, the witness said, to have two interments in one grave on the same day. The first would take place, for instance, at 1:30 o'clock. After a few shovelfulls had been thrown upon the coffin, the mourners would leave.
When they had gone the coffin would be taken out and put in the tool house, so that the grave would be ready for

the next body at 2:30. CANADIAN NURSE SHOT HERSELF London, June 1.-A Canadian nurse, Miss O'Neil, said to belong to a leading New York hospital, attempted to commit suicide by shooting herself with a pistol yesterday at the Hotel Metropole. The report of firearms was heard in her apartments, and when her room was entered, Miss O'Neil was found sitfrom her head. Friends removed her to a private residence, and it is hoped she will recover. Over-study is report-

ed to have unbalanced her mind. DREYFUS TRIAL REVISION. Paris, June 1.-At yesterday's session of the court of cassation. M. Manau, the procurator-general, resumed his address in the matter of revising the Dreyfus trial. The procurator-general wound up with an emphatic declaration that there was nothing in the secret dossier to incriminate Dreyfus. Continuing, M. Manau remarked: "Of the three secret documents by which M. Cavagnac, former minister of war, sought to jestify the condemnation, two were forgeries, and the third does not apply to Dreyfus." M. Manau went on: "We assert that several new facts exist, of such a nature as to prove Dreyfus' innocence. Therefore, may it please the court to quash the judgment of December 22, 1894, and send Dreyfus as a defendent before such courtmartial as the court may de-The court adjourned. cide."

"Vive le jury!" and singing the "Marselleise." MM. Deroulede and Marcel-Habert shook hands with everyone, and finally M. Deroulede mounted a table and called for cheers for the jury.

MASS MEETING

Trades' Unionists Discuss the Street Car Trouble,

And Resolve to Aid the Men in Their Fight for Recognition-Resolutions Passed-Big Demonstration To Be Held Next Tuesday.

Fully 1,400 trades unionists attended the secret mass meeting in the Jubilee Rink last night, and probably a more enthusiastic and determined lot of men have never before assembled in this city. Only individuals who could produce their union working cards, or who were vouched for by representatives of their union, could secure admission, and it was surprising the number of men who carry the little pasteboard in their vest pockets. The president of the local Trades and Labor Council occupied the chair. stated that the object of the meeting was to get at a thorough understanding of the street railway situation, and to inaugurate a systematic plan to carry on the existing struggle to a suc-

cessful conclusion. Rousing addresses were delivered by several prominent labor cham and the enthusiasm which they evoked was ample evidence that organized labor in London was thoroughly aroused. A large amount of the business transacted was of a private nature, but the appended resolutions, which have been given out for publication will show that the unions are preparing for a long struggle, if necessary, with the street railway corporation.

The matter of forming walking clubs in the different wards of the city was referred to the executive of the Trades and Labor Council. Arrangements were also commenced for a monster procession and mass meeting, to take place next Tuesday evening. As will be seen by reading the resolutions, it is proposed to levy a voluntary assessment on members of the different organizations, to be paid weekly, and this act alone shows their determination not to allow the Amalgamated Association to be crushed for lack of financial assistance.

Such a meeting for such a purpose should be full of significance to the directors of the London Street Railway Company, for, large as the gathering proved to be, yet hundreds of members engaged on the railroads and in other occupations requiring late hours were unable to be present, but they will be reached by the agencies at command of the various unions. There is no doubt ting on a couch with blood streaming whatever that organized labor will strain every nerve and leave no effort untried to bring the strike to a successful end. This is the first time in the history of the city when a secret mass meeting of union men has been held, and this fact alone is significant. The following resolutions were moved in the regular order, and carried with great enthusiasm. They require no explanation:

"Resolved, That the present street railway strike is not only the battle of the employes of the London Street Railway Company, but of every wage earner in the city, and the time has come when the grinding oppression of the great corporations and trusts must be met and checked, in the interests of humanity and civilization; therefore, be it resolved, that each labor organization in the city be requested to call a special meeting as early as possible to take steps toward the formation of a permanent defense fund to sustain the men who are now on strike, by a system of voluntary weekly assessments on each member, so that the members of the Amalgamated Association will feel that organized labor has taken a share in this conflict with a determination to prosecute it to the bitter end, even if con-

"Resolved, That committees be appointed to organize walking clubs every ward of the city, the said clubs to contribute a voluntary weekly donation for the sustenance of the men now on strike, and that subscription lists be prepared in order to give the citizens generally an opportunity to subscribe to the fund."

Resolved, That whereas, the Municipal Council of the City of Toronto, and other public bodies, have brought representation to bear upon the G. T. R. authorities in regard to the strike of the trackmen on its line; be it resolved, that in the opinion of this meeting the Municipal Council of the City of London should take similar ac-

"Resolved, that this gathering of organized wage-earners, in mass meeting assembled, hereby desires to place on record its hearty appreciation of the splendid services rendered to the public at large, and to organized labor in particular, by The London Advertiser, in exposing the bogus interviews prepared in the office of the London Street Railway Company, with the aim and intent of misleading the people and molding popular sentiment against the employes, and that we recommend the paper as one that has dealt fairly with organized labor, and refused to sell out or wear the corporation collar of the London Street Railway Company."

Other resolutions were also passed and referred to the different unions for further action. Some of these will be given publicity at the proper time, and as dealt with by the different bodies. The thanks of the street railway employes and the union men generally were tendered to Mr. C. W. Smith for the free use of the Jubilee rink. Mr. Smith very generously opened the
