WILL DEFEND HER RIGHTS

Spain's Commissioners Instructed Regarding the Philippines.

Formidable Uprising of the Carlists Anticipated.

British Charged With Abetting Civil War in Spain.

Madrid, Nov. 16.—The minister of foreign affairs, Duke Almodovar de Rio, has received dispatches from the Spanish peace commissioners now in Paris, indicating that today's meeting of the joint commissions will not be the last. The commissioners, it is added, have received additional instructions to defend Spain's rights in the Philippine Islands.

MORE TROUBLE FOR SPAIN.

The Madrid correspondent of the London Daily Mail says: "A leading Carlist tells me that he will be astonished if a formidable rising does not occur in Spain within a month after the peace treaty is signed. The Carlists have abundant supplies of money," and my informant says: "Only something very big and unexpected can prevent a rising." This appears to agree with the news that Don Carlos has succeeded in raising an important loan in London and in Paris, and that wealthy Carlist families are betting for their property against war risks.

The Imperialist of Madrid, commenting upon the loan which Don Carlos, the pretender to the Spanish throne, is said to have raised in London, says: "Evidently the English are betting for an outbreak of civil war in Spain, with the object of securing additional territory at Gibraltar." The Imperialist adds: "The Americans employed the same methods to become masters of COMMERCIAL CIRCLES EXCITED.

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THE LIBERAL IDEALS.

Mr. Hardy drew cheers by his glowing references to Sir Oliver Mowat, who was a true Liberal, because he believed in a proper conservatism. (Cheers.) During all that time the Liberals have proclaimed one doctrine, that of justice, tolerance and liberty. A Brilliant Banquet

Hon. A. S. Hardy Honored by Ontario Liberals.

A Magnificent Gathering at the Pavilion, Toronto.

Representative Liberals From All Parts of Ontario.

A Distinguished Array of Public Men Speak.

A Grand Tribute to Ontario's Faithful Premier—Details of the Great Event.

Toronto, Nov. 16.—The banquet to Hon. A. S. Hardy last night in the Pavilion was a magnificent success. His supporters gathered from every corner of the province to do him honor, to testify to the esteem in which they hold his leadership, to show, too, the spirit in which they face the political duties of the present hour. Fully one-half of the guests came from outside places, and every part of the province which Mr. Hardy administers sent its quota to cheer him.

The tribute to the premier's high qualities was an absolute success. It was a success not only in the unprecedented numbers who attended, and in the distances from which they traveled, but in the high level of the speaking. The premier's speech was a splendid effort, calm in 'point of delivery, powerfully conceived, uncompromising in its championing of Liberal principles, and keen in its analysis of the attacks to which he had been subjected. It was in Mr. Hardy's best fighting style. A brilliant array of speakers supported him. Great interest attached to the premier's appearance, and the minister of the interior gave his audience an exceedingly fine example of the practical man dealing with practical subjects. The stirring tale of the way in which was grappled the great work of opening up Canada's resources, of removing the obstacles which have stood in the way of her progress, and in an admirably lucid manner, and was listened to with profound attention. A feature of the evening was Mr. Hardy's tribute to Mr. Sifton, and the burst of applause which the mention of his name elicited. Hon. Mr. Mulock and Hon. William Paterson dealt with several aspects of Dominion affairs in their personal style, and Mr. Ross, as usual, showed himself a consummate after-dinner speaker in his handling of political issues. Not a hitch marred a splendidly-managed and most enthusiastic demonstration, the political and hand-picked system of letters and numbers obviated all confusion.

The decorations, with their color scheme of white and chocolate, were those of the dinner to Lord and Lady Aberdeen a week ago, with the addition of a gigantic "Hardy" in the colored electric lights which lit up the great hall from behind, and which was draped in Union Jacks. While the general decorations were simple, and indeed, massive, the tables were exceedingly daintily in their setting. Baskets of roses and wreaths of ferns and flowers, and white candles sent up mounting graceful from candlesticks gave an exceedingly pretty finish to the scene. Not only was the arrangement aesthetic, it was also practical, for every man's seat was allotted before he had time to get up, and the numbers obviated all confusion.

But the most impressive thing about the dinner was the men who were there. There were fully 450 guests present, and the tables were packed with a closeness which made the deftness of the waiters all the more creditable. They came from everywhere. (Cheers.) It is because of that we see him traduced, that we see him maligned, and if the Reform party of this province of this Canada of ours lend a willing ear to interested traducing, to interested defamation, then they will listen to what has been said with an open mind, and they will know where the interested source from which it comes. Mr. Hardy concluded with this fine burst of eloquence: "Unalterably determined as we are to maintain British connection and to have some share in the authority and the power wielded by the mightiest empire since the dawn of time, and in the glory which attaches to her history, we are, notwithstanding, distinctly Canadian, and grow more and more with British training, British sympathies, a fixed loyalty to British connection, and as part of the mighty empire which encircles the globe with her colonies and her possessions, in both hemispheres, on every continent, in every clime, in every zone. She is great in Europe, nearly as great in Asia, nearly as great in America, Africa and Australasia and in the islands of the sea. Of what other nation now, in the past could be said with truth, 'Her flag floats on every sea, and she is unconquerable and triumphant wherever it floats.' (Loud cheers.) With an invincible spirit, boundless enterprise, adventurous spirit, Britons and prize, adventurous spirit, stand for liberty and good, free government in every quarter of the globe. Notwithstanding this she loves peace rather than war. Her triumphs are those of peace rather than those of war.
