### THE WORK OF AN **ANGRY WOMAN**

#### Details of the Loss Caused by the Fire

at Dawson City. Vancouver. B. C., Nov. 16.-Belle Mitchell, who caused the fire in Dawson City which did \$500,000 damage, has been the author of two previous fires. The fire of a year ago was caused by this woman, who threw a lamp at a man with whom she had a quarrel. A month ago she burned her own place on Third avenue, in Dawson, by throwing a lamp at a woman. The losses are as follows: Worden Hotel, \$40,000; Pattison & McGraw's New England Saloon, \$44,000; postoffice building, owned by Alex. McDonald, \$1,000; Green Tree Saloon, \$35,000; Empire bakery building, \$40,000; McPherson & Johnson, \$20,000; Vancouver Hotel, \$25,000; John Sargent, New Saloon, \$3,000; New York Store and Ladies' Bazar, \$21,000; Case & Gilsey, \$8,000; Mason Tortoni Jack Thiern, Nellie Lewis and several others, \$43,000; Hibbard, boot and shoe store, and sixteen small buildings, \$6,-000: E. A. Suter, jeweler, lost everything he had; I. Flataw, tailor, in same building, \$6,000; John McDonald, tailor, \$6,000; George Brewett, tailor, \$8,000; Foley, butcher, \$5,000; Seattle Lunch Counter, \$5,000; restaurant, small stores, etc., on opposite side of street, \$29,000; two cabins, occupied by women, furni-ture, etc., \$18,000; other damage claimloses, \$100,000, deduction 50 per cent, \$50,000; total, \$503,000. There is no insurance at Dawson, and the loss falls entirely upon the individuals.

A number of the buildings burned contained shot and shell, and a number of the fire-fighters received injuries as a result of the fire. Among these were Pte. Mullins, of the infantry, contusions, sprains and burns; G. O. Ellis, contusions on head and a shattered shoulder; Dan Millen, scalp cut and skull cracked; W. A. Jones, head battered and burned; Constable Tipp, burns and sprains; Pte. Enfield, face and arms burned; Al Halkens, leg badly wrenched.

Toronto, Nov. 16.—The banquet to Hon. A. S. Hardy last night in the Pavilion was a magnificent success. His supporters gathered from every corner of the province to do him honor, to testify to the esteem in which they hold his leadership, to show, too, the spirit in which they face the political duties of the present hour. Fully onehalf of the guests came from outside places, and every part of the province which Mr. Hardy administers sent its quota to cheer him.

The tribute to the premier's high was a success not only in the unprecedented numbers who attended, and in the distances from which they traveled, but in the high level of the speaking. THE DECORATIONS. The decorations, with their color scheme of white and chocolate, were those of the dinner to Lord and Lady Aberdeen a week ago, with the addition of a gigantic "Hardy" in the colored electric lights which lit up the guest table from behind, and which was draped in Union Jacks. While the general decorations were simple, and, indeed, massive, the tables were exceedingly dainty in their setting. Baskets of roses and wreaths of ferns and roses set them off, while candles surmounting graceful iron candlesticks gave an exceedingly pretty finish to the scene. Not only was the arrangement aesthetic, it was also practical, for every man's seat was allotted beforehand, and a system of letters and numbers obviated all confusion.

THE ATTENDANCE. But the most impressive thing about the dinner was the men who were there. There were fully 450 guests present, and the tables were packed with a closeness which made the deftness of the waiters all the more creditable. They came from everywhere. South Brant sent a splendid delegation, adorned with the badge which they carried to victory in March last—a badge which Mr. Hardy wore-and occupying a coign of vantage in the center of the hall, from which pealed forth at intervals their Hardy war-cry. The elite of Ontario Liberalism was present, and the old guard rubbed shoulders with the youths who see the future of Canada expanding before them, who feel that it is indeed good to be young in these days, when the wine of nation hood warms the blood of our people. It was a responsive audience, which cheered Mr. Hardy to the echo, and which showed itself quick to appreciate the manliness of Mr. Sifton's reply to his traducers. The audience was by no means exclusively male, for a bank of ladies occupied the gallery and listened with marked interest to the

speeches. Just before the speaking commenced Mrs. Hardy entered the gallery and occupied a seat in the center. Her advent was observed, and in a moment the men below were on their feet, and cheers rang out and the graceful Chautauqua salute was given.

#### AT THE HEAD TABLE.

Shortly after 8 o'clock Hon. Mr. Hardy made his appearance. As he came on the dais the colored lights of the inscription behind his chair lit up, and the first taste of the enthusiasm of the evening was given by the cheer which rang out all over the hall at the sight of the chieftain. Hon. George A. Cox was the chairman, and in the place of honor to his right was Hon. Mr. Hardy. Still to the right were Hon. Wm. Mulock, Hon. J. M. Gibson, Rev. Dr. Thomas, Mr. Elias Rogers, Hon. E. J. Davis, Rev. Dr. G. M. Milligan, Hon. John Dryden, Rev. Dr. Dewart and Mr. J. H. Mackenzle, To the left of the chairman were Hon. David Mills, Hon. Wm. Paterson, Hon. Clifford Sifton, Hon. George W. Ross, Rev. Dr. Parker, Mr. C. B. Heyd, M.P., Rev. Father Ryan, Mr. Robert Jaffray and Mr. J. K. Kerr, Q.C. Grace was pronounced by Rev. Dr. Milligan.

#### THE FUTURE PATH.

In the future, the cause of labor, the fisheries of the great lakes, further development of the mining industry, reforestation and development of our great Northwest, would be the special care of the party. The heritage of the Canadian people was only beginning to be appreciated by them; what other 5,000,000 people had such a herit-

age? The Kootenays are today the richest mining centers in existence; further is the Yukon. These add to our wealth and our reputation in the continental countries of Europe. Speaking of the development of the Yukon, Mr. Hardy paid a splendid tribute to Hon. Clifford Sifton. The Yukon had hardly been known until it was provided with a governor and government, with soldiers, with cavalry, with mounted policemen and with law, because there was a man in the cabinet who knew something of the country—a man with the mind, the soul and the vision to grasp the situation. (Cheers.) It is because of that we see him traduced, that we see him maligned; and if the Reform party of this province of this Canada of ours lend a willing ear to nterested traducing, to interested defamation, then they will listen to what has been said with an open ear; otherwise they will know the interested source from which it comes. (Cheers.) Mr. Hardy concluded with this fine

burst of eloquence: "Unalterably determined as we are to maintain British connection and to have some share in the authority and the power wielded by the mightiest empire since the dawn of time, and in the glory which attaches to her history we are, notwithstanding, distinctly Canadian, and grow more so with British training, British sympathies, a fixed loyalty to British connection, and as part of the mighty empire which encircles the globe with her colonies and her possessions in both hemispheres, on every continent, in every clime, in every zone. She is great in Europe, nearly as great in Asia, nearly as great in America, Africa and Australasia and in the islands of the sea. Of what other nation now or in the past could be said with truth, 'Her flag floats on every sea, and she is unconquerable and triumphant wherever it floats?" (Loud cheers.) With an invincible spirit, boundless enterprise, adventurous souls, Britons and British stock stand for liberty and good, free government in every quarter of the globe. Notwithstanding this she loves peace rather than war. Her triumphs are those of peace rather than those of war. She is emphatically a nation of peaceful aims and pursuits, and in time of peace she has been likened to a great battleship or man-of-war lying calm and motionless, but when the time of action arrives she ruffles her swelling plumage, puts on all her beauty and bravery and collects her scattered ele-Lennox.
