Patrol Very Active.

During the agrly part of the month During the early part of the month continual rain and wind made operations on a large scale impossible, but preparations for the attack were carried on steadily so far as conditions permitted, proceeding more rapidly as the weather gradually improved. Meantime our patrols displayed great activity, and in conjunction with small raids frequently penetrate the German positions to a considerable depth. Bold daylight reconnaissances were made on several occasions, and much valuable information was obtained.
