O white, austere, ideal place, Where only soft will care to come, Where spring hath lost the weaving track. She wears for us at home.

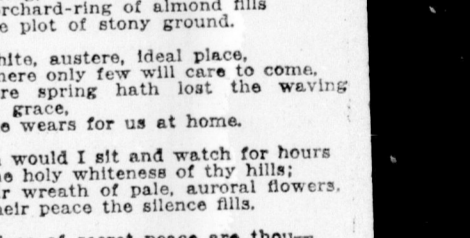

The true secret of physical beauty is to be born pretty.



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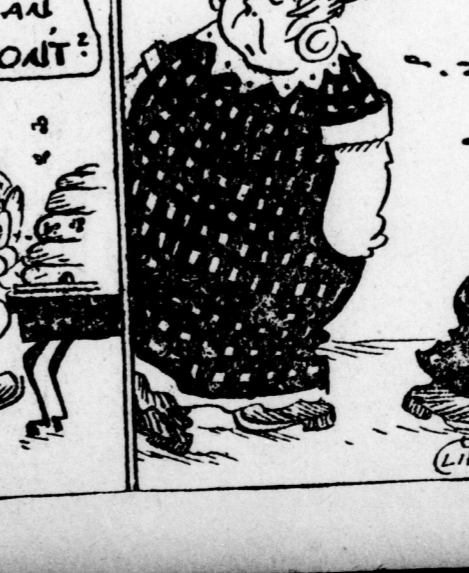
POLLY AND HER PALS.—Pa Prefers Doing Without Sugar To Being Stung Again.



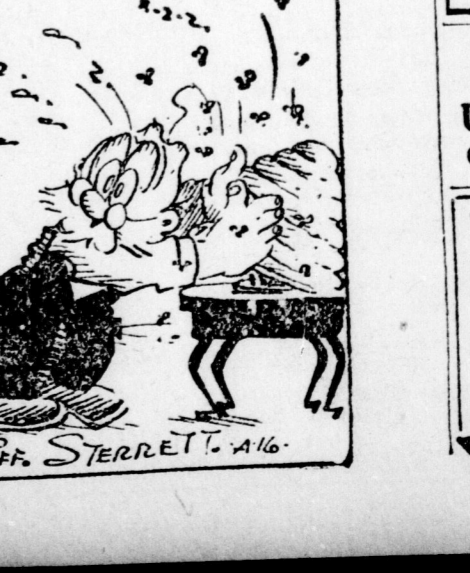
