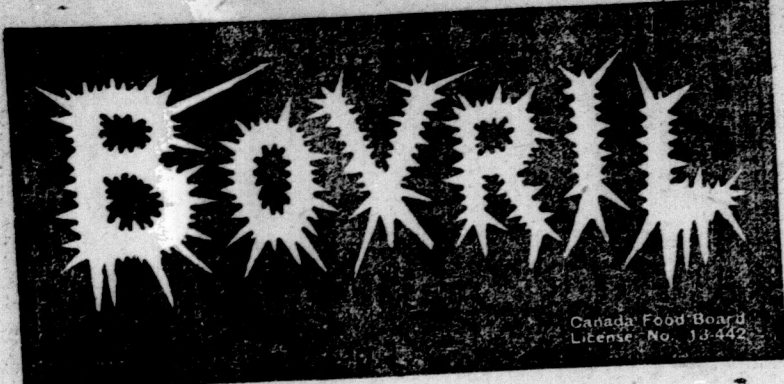

SIR HENRY DRAYTON IS DELIGHTED WITH LOAN ORGANIZATION

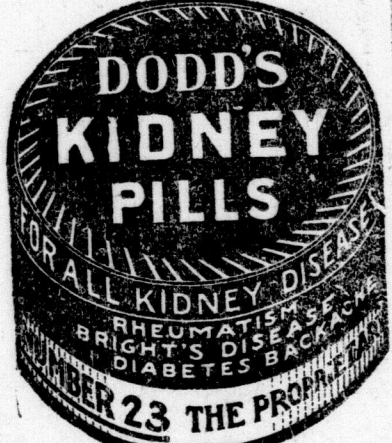
Says Most of the Old and Tried Workers Will Be on the Job.

TORONTO, Sept. 11.—Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, who was in Toronto today in connection with the organization for the Victory Loan, 1919, stated that reports from all over the country indicated that the organization everywhere would be strong and complete, and that the great majority of the tried and experienced workers on former campaigns would be found at their old posts and working with all their old and added determination to repeat the successes of the past. He was particularly gratified with the manner in which the men who were connected with last year's and other loan campaigns, had come forward and offered their services to help make this year's loan a success. Sir Henry desired the prestige to emphasize the national necessity of the success of the loan, on which depended not only the payment of past obligations, but also soldiers' gratuities and soldiers' land settlement, and in view of this national necessity will not, he hoped, that municipalities will not, until the Victory Loan is finished, make any offering of securities to the public.

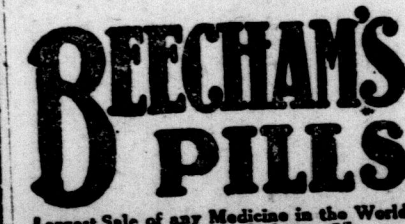

GEN. HOGARTH FAVORS A STRAIGHT "NO" ON REFERENDUM

PORT ARTHUR, Sept. 11.—Major-General D. M. Hogarth, M. P. P., who went overseas as a lieutenant and returned as a quartermaster-general of the Canadian forces, today declared himself as favoring a straight "No" vote on the referendum to repeal or amend the Ontario Temperance Act, basing his views on the improved conditions of the province in comparison with the days of the open bar when he went overseas.

Government To Name Committee To Take Up Gratuity Matter

Compromise Is Reached Following Demand of Veterans for Consideration of Their Claims—Trouble Feared Unless Borden's Decision Modified.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Sept. 11.—A compromise has been reached in connection with the demand of the great war veterans, whose representatives for the past week have been conferring with the Government, canvassing the members, and generally pressing their claims for appointment of a royal commission to inquire into and report on the matter of better terms to the returning men and their dependents. It is stated tonight that the Government, which retains a royal commission on the grounds that it already possessed all the knowledge necessary to deal with the situation, and that further heavy outlays were impossible in view of the strained condition of the treasury, and the heavy and inevitable demands upon it, has now decided to appoint a parliamentary committee to inquire into that which has been settling on the question of pensions for the past three sessions, and before which evidence will be heard. On that committee there will be most of the soldier representatives of the House, and members of the executive of the Civil Service establishment. Tomorrow afternoon it is anticipated that the Government will bring in a bill to consolidate the various orders-in-council dealing with soldiers' civil re-advantage of the opportunity to set forth what has already been done, financially and otherwise, to bring back to civil life the general financial condition of the country, etc. It is understood that the pressure brought to bear upon the Government is such as to create the belief that unless there was a reversal or modification of the attitude, serious trouble might ensue.

PRINCE GETS ABOARD A BUCKING BRONCHO IN THE "WILD WEST"

He Sees Stock "Stampede" For First Time at Saskatoon.

SASKATOON, Sept. 11.—For the first time in the history of Saskatoon an heir to the throne visited here today and was accorded a welcome from fully 60,000 persons, farmers from the district for miles around journeying to pay enthusiastic honor to their future king. After the usual welcoming ceremonies, the prince was driven out to the exhibition grounds, where he witnessed a "stampede," something which he had never seen before. Riding bucking bronchos, steer throwing, wild-horse races, steer riding, and other exciting events were part of the program. The prince was asked permission to ride one of the bucking bronchos and amid the wildest cheers the prince rode down the track surrounded by cowboys and cowgirls.

WAKENED BY CHEERS. ON PRINCE OF WALES SPECIAL EN ROUTE, Sept. 11.—People are turning out in force to greet the prince of Wales, even at places where the train does not stop. At Minnedosa in the very small hours, the prince was awakened with cheers and singing of the National Anthem by the crowd on the platform.

MASKED MEN MURDER MINERS IN COLORADO

TELLURIDE, Colo., Sept. 11.—Four miners were shot and killed, and a fifth was shot and badly wounded in the Tomboy Mine Car here early today by a group of masked men, who, it was learned, were not ascertained this afternoon, are under arrest.

Nationalization of Mines Approved by Miners' Convention

Only One Dissenting Voice—Six-Hour Day Five-Day Week Urged.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 11.—Nationalization of mines as a general principle was approved this afternoon by the convention of the United Mine Workers of America with only one dissenting voice, the sole object being to nationalize an impossibility. He later explained that he only meant impossible for the present.

The convention voted with the same unanimity for the six-hour day and five-day week in all coal mines, to be incorporated in the demands presented to the mine operators at the joint wage conference at Buffalo, Sept. 25, but deferred discussion of specific wage demands until next week.

COMMERCE BOARD MAY ASK GOVT. TO ABOLISH DUTY ON U.S. BACON

Evidence at Winnipeg Hearing Indicates Such Action Is Contemplated

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 11.—A hint that the Government may be asked to abolish the three-cent a pound duty on bacon was given by Judge H. A. Robson today at the first local sitting of the board of commerce under the combined and fair prices act. Judge Robson's statement followed the evidence of John Guest, manager of the National Meat department, when he told of buying 1,500 pounds of bacon from Armour's in Duluth, Minn., last week as an experiment. "Our figures are not complete, but we believe that we can save a pound on the same grade bought locally," he said. It was suggested that the rate of exchange of Canadian money in the United States had not been considered, and Mr. Guest was asked to bring exact figures at a later sitting. "That's an important point," Judge Robson said. "If the cost to the consumer can be reduced by throwing off the duty we will make a recommendation to the Government that the duty be thrown off."
