Liberals Protest Intervention

LONDON, Aug. 9.—Premier Lloyd George presided over a full cabinet council on his return to the city tonight from the Lympne conference, and reported to his colleagues the result of the conference with Premier Millerand of France, and discussed its bearings in connection with the statement which is to be made to Parliament by him tomorrow.

The Independent Liberals held a meeting in the House of Commons tonight and passed a resolution protesting against any intervention against Russia by way of blockade, men, money or munitions.

The Independent Liberals in the House of Commons number about 30.

**Decrease In Nation's Debt
Is Apparent Rather Than
Real, Statement Shows****Statistics For Month of July
Show Apparent Reduction
of Sixty-Five Million Dollars—Largely Due To
Transfer From Consolidated
Funds To Investments.**

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—By the Canadian Press.—An apparent decrease of not less than \$65,221,114 in the debt of the Dominion which at the end of July stood at \$2,300,119,030 is shown in the financial statement for the month of July, issued today by the department of finance. The figures are, however, more apparent than real, this exceptionally good showing being due in a large measure to transfers from the consolidated funds to "investments" of forty million dollars covering loans to soldier settlers by the land settlement board.

Deduction of the forty million still leaves the debt smaller than it was at the end of June by twenty-five million dollars, but this again is in a measure due to a change in the Government's interest period, which was largely

responsible for a drop in expenditures for July to \$22,789,304, as compared with \$40,064,840 during July, 1919. Expenditures for August 1920 for the month of July 31 was \$104,908,326 on consolidated fund, as against \$76,515,862 in 1919.

Expenditures on the capital account side of the ledger make a splendid showing, and this is almost entirely due to the practical disappearance of the item of "war expenditure" which has contributed more than anything else to the growth of the public debt. The figures demonstrating this statement show a total war expenditure for the first four months of the fiscal year, 1919, of \$117,276,826, as against only \$2,078,074 for the same period this year.

The revenue side of the financial statement indicates such buoyancy that there is reason to hope that the time is not far distant when some of the revenue may be available for purposes of debt reduction. The four months collections by the customs and other revenue-producing departments totalled \$145,069,585, as compared with \$99,631,970, for the similar period in 1919. For July alone the collections were \$46,220,491, whereas in July, 1919, they amounted only to \$26,554,066. A jump in customs collections from \$49,164,603 to \$69,773,177 contributed the largest percentage of the increase, while the war tax revenues were higher than those collected in 1919 by several millions.

**IMPORTANT CHANGES
IN SPEEDWELL STAFF****Dr. Bryce McMurich New
Superintendent of Guelph
Hospital.****TWO PHYSICIANS LEAVE****Dr. Kearney of Byron Sanatorium To Fill One of
Vacancies.**

GUELPH, Aug. 9.—Another important change in the staff at Speedwell Hospital was announced today, when it was learned that Dr. Bryce McMurich of Toronto had been appointed medical superintendent of the institution in place of Dr. G. N. Urie, who has held the position since his return from overseas, about three years ago. No particulars of the new appointment could be obtained, but it is believed that the change is due to the recent shake-up at the hospital, when the entire nursing staff walked out in sympathy with Nursing Sister Pollock, who was discharged for refusing to do work in the diet kitchen. Dr. Urie, who is at present on his vacation, was not available today, and it is not known whether he will remain on the medical staff as assistant medical superintendent or not, after his return. The new medical superintendent, who arrived in the city this evening, is a returned officer and served overseas with the C. A. M. C. He has been connected with the Davisville Hospital at Toronto, and comes to Guelph highly recommended. Dr. Kearney and Dr. Egan, who have also been at Speedwell for some time past, have left the hospital, and are going to London, England, where they will take up special courses in English medical schools. Dr. Kearney of Byron Sanatorium has been appointed to fill one of the vacancies. The second appointment has not yet been made.

**WOODSTOCK PEOPLE
INJURED IN TWO
MOTOR ACCIDENTS****Five Out of Nine Persons Hurt
Are Still in the
Hospital.**

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 9.—Nine Woodstock persons, and a man from Hickson were the victims of two auto accidents in this vicinity during the week-end. Five of them are in the hospital. Shortly after midnight Saturday, Norman Macintosh's Ford truck overturned with him and his wife and Misses Lillian Macintosh and Vera Bickel. Miss Macintosh's collar-bone was broken, and the other three escaped with minor injuries. The three women were returning from a picnic at Port Stanley.

The second accident happened on the Swaburg road, Sunday evening. Mrs. Nixon, Billie Nixon, Miss Jane Appleton and Mrs. Roberts of this city are in the hospital with a variety of injuries, although no bones were broken. Mr. Roberts and Mr. Harwood, owner of the car from Hickson, were slightly hurt.

**LABOR VICTOR OVER
COALITION IN NORFOLK**

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(Canadian Associated Press).—The result of the South Norfolk election consequent on the succession of Mr. Cozens Hardy, the late member, to the peerage resulted as follows:

Edwards, Labor, 8,594; Barry, Coalition-Liberal, 6,476; Roberts, Independent-Liberal, 2,118.

Fifty-seven per cent of the electorate voted. Mr. Edwards was largely identified with the agricultural laborers' organizations, which is very strong in the constituency. He previously represented Lincoln in Parliament.

**MANNIX SAYS HE
DESIRED ONLY TO
VISIT IRISH HOME****Australian Prelate Claims He
Has No Mission.**

PENZANCE, Cornwall, Aug. 9.—Archbishop Mannix was issued here from a destroyer at 4:15 o'clock this afternoon. When asked by the correspondent of the Associated Press if he cared to say anything about his mission to England, Archbishop Mannix replied:

"I have a mission to England; my landing in England is involuntary. I do not desire to go to England, but I have to go to Ireland. Ireland is my home. I am a native of Ireland, and it is seven years since I left. It is a people who I have loved and loved in Australia the whole time since." Few people witnessed the arrival of the prelate. He remained at the home of Canon Wade until his departure on the night train for London. He was surprised when the news that he was even permitted to go to Liverpool.

The original intention was to land him at Fishguard, but the Government wireless the destroyer, ordering him taken to Penzance.

FOUR DESTROYERS USED.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—Four British destroyers were used to land the archbishop Mannix from the United States, off the Irish coast in the early hours of this morning, and the commander of the destroyer Wivern, with two Scotch and two English destroyers, went aboard and placed the archbishop under technical arrest. They escorted the prelate, with his secretary, the Rev. Albert Vaughan, a destroyer which steamed toward Fishguard, where orders had been given to land the archbishop.

A wireless from the admiralty, however, reached them en route with instructions to proceed to Penzance, at the extreme southwestern tip of England. The archbishop was landed there this afternoon. He was accompanied by a representative of Scotland Yard to the home of Canon Wade and afterwards took the night train for London.

Thus the question of the landing place of Archbishop Mannix, which for many days has been a subject of discussion by Irishmen everywhere, as well as the public in general was answered.

The officers boarded the Baltic and presented the archbishop to the commander of the destroyer Wivern, in Ireland, and Field Marshal Sir Henry Hughes Wilson, chief of the Imperial staff, it is stated.

General Macleod's order forbade the archbishop to land in Ireland. General Wilson's communication informed the archbishop that he could not land at Manchester, Liverpool or Glasgow.

MASSACRE JAPANESE.

LONDON, August 9.—A Reuter dispatch from Vladivostok says the government has received advice that the Japanese residents of Okhotsk, a maritime town of Siberia, on the Sea of Okhotsk, have been massacred and the town burned.

garding Cost.**


