RENFREW GIVES MACKENZIE KING CIVIC WELCOME
Banquet Followed by Reading of Address by Mayor in Armory.

RENFREW, Ont., Aug. 26.—Hon. Wm. L. Mackenzie King and A. R. McMaster, M.P., addressed a mass meeting of 2,000 people at the local armory this evening. Mr. King's party arrived from Ottawa a little more than an hour before the meeting opened and were greeted by representatives of the town and of the South Renfrew Liberal Association. The town was gay with bunting, and two bands played the Liberal members from the railroad station to their hotel. At the armory Mayor Moss, a Conservative, read a civic address of welcome, and Mr. E. D. Osbourne, president of the Liberal Reform Association, presented an address from the Liberal Association of South Renfrew.

Appeals to Farmers.
Mr. King, who was given an enthusiastic welcome, made a strong appeal to both labor and farmers to enter politics but not to enter as a class because, he said, if one class gained ground, jealousy would be engendered in another class which would prove disastrous to both. He invited both parties to join forces with the Liberals, who, he said, were real democrats and ready to put into effect the lessons which the war had taught. He advocated tariff reform and described as dishonest people who talked free trade at this stage of Canada's history. He advocated reduction of the duties on necessities of life.

Government With Combines.
"The country is honeycombed with combines at the present time," he said, "and the Government, instead of trying to combat them, are playing into their hands." He also strongly criticized a party which changed its name, policy and premier without reference to the people of the country. Surely, he stated, no one could allege they were being governed by the people. Other interesting addresses were given by Mr. Joseph Archambault, K.C., M.P., Chambliss-Vercheres, and Mr. A. R. McMaster, M.P., Brome, who attacked the Union Government for its autocratic policy.

J. J. MORRISON IS NOT MEMBER OF HYDRO INFORMATION ASSN.
President Fraser Says U. F. O. Is Not Financing Bureau.

TORONTO, Aug. 26.—With reference to the newly organized "Ontario Hydro Information Association," of which Col. J. E. Fraser of Barford is president, and ex-Mayor J. M. Elson of St. Catharines, secretary, J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario, tonight stated that he was not a member of the organization and that it was not being financed by the U. F. O.

Col. Fraser, the president, stated: "Neither the U. F. O. nor any other political party, nor any aggregation of people opposed to hydro-electric interests are behind or financing this bureau, which has been inaugurated with the intention of making thorough and impartial investigation of the whole hydro radial situation throughout the province."

MORAVIANTOWN
MORAVIANTOWN, Aug. 26.—Rev. Arthur Barner, superintendent of Indian Missions of the Methodist Church, will preach here next Sunday morning and evening.
Most of the fall wheat is threshed around here, and the oats are being rushed through the machine. Both crops are yielding well, but the oats are not as good a sample as usual, owing to the continuous rains. One Indian is expecting a thousand bushels of grain this year when threshing is completed.
The Methodist Sunday school picnic was held in the Mission Grove on Monday. The attendance was good and all had a good time. The brass band which was disbanded during the war, has been reorganized and provided a delightful program of music at the picnic.

PAY NATION'S DEBT?

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 26.—Members of the party of leading grainmen and bankers who traversed the three prairie provinces this month reported on their return home that if the crop of 1921 produced as much money as the crop of 1920, the three prairie provinces will in two seasons yield a sufficient sum to pay the national debt of the Dominion.
One of the bankers was George H. Prince, chairman of the board of the Merchants Bank of St. Paul. He estimated that the value of the Western crop at a billion dollars, and said that only about fifteen per cent of the harvest was under cultivation. The wheat crop this year, he thought, would be 250,000,000 bushels, and the area under crop, he was informed, was 20,000,000 acres.
Prince anticipated that United States would aid materially in financing Western Canada, and that very large quantities of the wheat raised here would be milled in Minneapolis.

CROSS-BORDER RATES FOR FREIGHT TRAFFIC ARE NOW INCREASED
OTTAWA, Aug. 26.—(By Canadian Press.)—The order of the railway commission, authorizing increases in the joint rates on traffic passing across the international boundary, went into effect today. This order was made on the application of the American Railway Association, which represented the railway commission that increases had been authorized by the interstate commerce commission on United States roads, and that the rates authorized by that body should be made applicable to international joint rates. The order applies to all rates and charges which were increased under the order of the interstate commerce commission.

TARIFF INQUIRY WILL BEGIN SEPTEMBER 14
OTTAWA, Aug. 26.—(By Canadian Press.)—The official itinerary of the tariff inquiry commission, issued to-night, covering the four western provinces and as far as Windsor in the East, provides for fourteen sittings on the other side of the great lakes and three additional sittings at Port William and Port Arthur, Sault Ste. Marie and Windsor.
