## TARIFF

Sir Edward Grey Declares Effects Would Demoralize Budget Protest Meeting.

LONDON, June 23.—(C.A.P.)—Sir Edward Grey, speaking at the National Liberal Club in reference to tariff reform as an alternative to the ruin of the country, said that the tariff reformers were not the last imperialist, but the first to be demoralized by the effects of the tariff reform.

Supporting the provisions of the budget signed by nearly forty London bankers and merchants and sent to Premier Asquith May 14, there was a great meeting in the city this afternoon, at which it was resolved that the "Main proposals of the budget weaken security in all private property, discourage enterprise and thrift, and would prove seriously injurious to the commerce and industry of the country."

## COAL AND LUMBER DUTIES

U. S. Senate Makes Short Work of Suggesting Amendments.

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 23.—After voting down amendments for \$1 and \$1.25 duty in lumber, the senate today adopted the finance committee recommendation of a duty of \$1.50 on lumber, with a differential on finished lumber.

## AUSTRALIAN POLICY

Active Endeavor to Get Immigrants, Says Deakin.

MELBOURNE, Australia, June 23.—(C.A.P.)—Premier Deakin told parliament today that an active policy of immigration was being pursued, with an appointment of a high commissioner if necessary, and an endeavor would be made to cheapen cable charges and send mail and express parcels by air.

## DAMAGE BY ELECTROLYSIS

Expert Reports to Winnipeg of an Alarming Nature.

WINNIPEG, June 23.—That the known damage to the domestic supply and high pressure water mains through electrolysis amounts to thousands of dollars already, and that it is possible a great many water mains in the central portion of the city are very seriously affected thru the currents of electricity escaping from the street car rails, is the essence of the report presented to the board of control by Prof. L. A. Herd of McGill University, who has been conducting tests for several months.

## DR. GILCHRIST IS CHIEF OF S.O.S. GRAND CAMP

Defeats F. S. Mearns by Narrow Margin—Hunter Rate at Age of Entry.

The Grand Camp of the Sons of Scotland concluded its business yesterday afternoon. It was decided to meet next year in London. The Grand Camp approved the principle of raising the minimum age of entry, with a recommendation that the grand executive consider the question of special rates to old members. The increases will run from 40 cents per month per thousand for the minimum age of 15 cents, decreasing F. S. Mearns by 100 votes to 102. Mr. Mearns did not run for grand chief, but headed the list for the grand executive by a large majority.

## BETTER OFF WITH CANTEN

## OTTAWA HOTTEST PLACE

Toronto Comparatively Cool With Temperature of 82 Degrees.

The Ottawa Valley District received a scorching day, with the temperature at several points being above 90 degrees. Stone Cliff reported 92. Thru-out the valley the temperature was over 90 degrees and the other provinces were comparatively cool. The weather was particularly pleasant in the west, particularly Saskatchewan, were comparatively cool. The temperature yesterday was about eight degrees above the average.

## ELEVEN DROWN IN IRISH LAKE

Boat With English and American Tourists Overturns in Killarney—Two Boatmen Saved.

KILLARNEY, Ireland, June 23.—A large rowboat, carrying five American and four English tourists and two Irish boatmen, or 13 in all, was swamped in a gale while crossing Lower Killarney Lake this afternoon. All of the tourists and two of the boatmen were drowned. The victims were Mrs. A. A. Hilton and son of Toronto, Canada; Mr. and Mrs. Longhead, of Loughhead, Boston; Miss M. H. Catum or Cotum of Massachusetts; Rev. B. Barton and sister of London, and Miss Florence Wilkinson and cousin of Brentwood, Essex; Boatmen Con. Toomey and Con. Gleason. None of the bodies were recovered to-night.

The boat was a four-oared craft, used for taking visitors about the lake. Most of the passengers were guests at the Great Southern Hotel. When the lower lake was reached, it was found that a heavy wind from the north-west was blowing. Several other boats that had started over the same course put back.

## TRAINLOAD IMPLEMENTS TO HARVEST GRAIN CROP

Cheering Reports of Probable Yield Reach Office of Massey-Harris Co.

A solid trainload of harvesting machinery, consisting of 20 carloads, was shipped to Winnipeg and beyond last night over the C. P. R. by the Massey-Harris Company. From now until the harvesting of the Northwest is completed, it is estimated that this firm will ship to Manitoba and the far west an average of five carloads a day.
