ALIENIST, TESTIFYING ASSAILS MURDERED MAN

Called Down by Judge for His Remarks—Bradley Defence Closed.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Dramatic scenes marked the proceedings today in the trial of Mrs. Annie M. Bradley, charged with having killed former Senator Arthur M. Brown of Utah, in this city last December. Bradley, a native of New York, the alienist who testified in the Thaw case, not only declared that Mrs. Bradley was insane when she shot her husband, but entered with such vigor in defending his opinion and in denunciation of the conduct of the dead senator, that Justice Stafford reminded the witness that the late senator was not on trial and not there to defend himself, and admonished him to refer to the dead man only when necessary to show the effect of his acts upon the mind of the defendant.

Dead Senator's Son. The appearance of the stand of Max Brown, son of the dead senator, who was called in to testify, was greeted in the extreme. The young man, tall, slender and fragile of physique—looking as he made his way to the stand as though he had been carefully avoided looking toward the defendant, who sat within ten feet of him. When he told of seeing his father and Mrs. Bradley in the kitchen of their home, with jars of fruit they had brought from the cellar at a time when his mother had been called away from the city to the bedside of her dying sister, the defendant laughed and lowered her head in scorn. She then turned her eyes of merriment on the face of the witness, who replied briefly to all questions put to him and lowered his eyes during intervals in the giving of his testimony.

Believed Woman Insane. Dr. Charles E. Hill, professor of nervous and mental diseases in the Baltimore Medical College, declared that in his opinion Mrs. Bradley was insane when she shot her husband. He said that several abortions performed on her, her suffering and disappointment and her hereditary taint of insanity, all combined to produce insanity in her. He thought she shot Senator Brown intentionally, but believing that she was doing right in doing so.

A number of witnesses from Salt Lake, including Max Brown, were introduced by the government in rebuttal. Several of them testified that Mrs. Bradley, during their years of acquaintance with her, appeared at all times rational and affable. It was brought out that Senator Brown had made a proposition to Mrs. Bradley to accept a \$5000 house and \$100 a month until her youngest child should be 21 years of age, if she would leave Mr. Brown alone, but she indignantly declined the offer, saying that she wanted to marry Brown in order that her children by him might be given a name.

Prisoner Wept and Sobbed. During the testimony Mrs. Bradley wept and sobbed and in the forenoon session gave every indication that she was about to collapse. She, however, mustered such strength as she possessed and concluded the day's ordeal in fair condition.

CHURCHES WILL UNITE IN FOREIGN PLACES

To Support One Church for the English Speaking Population.

The executive of the foreign mission committee of the Canadian Presbyterian Church met yesterday, the convener, Rev. W. A. J. Martin of Toronto, in the hall of the church. It was announced that the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Brandon, has undertaken to support as their own foreign missionary, Rev. D. McLeod, who went out this fall to North Formosa.

The estimates for the work at the South China mission, near Canton, for next year were passed upon. It was determined to purchase a property at Kongmun, a city with 100,000 inhabitants, in the Canton district, as it was decided to establish the mission permanently in that region.

The transfer of the work, which has hitherto been energetically carried on by the American Presbyterians in the Santo district, to the Canadian Presbyterian Church was sanctioned. The estimates for the Macow mission in South Hill, which for next year were approved. Buildings are to be erected at this point, but the sum that will be required is not at present known.

The foreign mission committee has granted the services of the Rev. A. W. Longhead, one of its missionaries at Honsan, in North China, to the foreign department of the world Y. M. C. A., labor among some 17,000 Chinese students in South China.

It was agreed to unite with the other Canadian churches in giving financial assistance towards the important work of maintaining union churches in oriental cities, where many foreigners reside. These include young men employed in governmental and consular service, and in business. It was felt that young men exposed to such great temptations should be given oversight, and that for this purpose it was better to establish a union church, which, although it will need at the present time some help, will within a year or two be self-sustaining.

Dr. J. M. Waters, a medical missionary stationed at Urgan, in Central India, was granted a year's furlough. Dr. Waters will leave India on Jan. 7, and will spend his furlough in Canada. His home is practically in this city, but his wife's relatives live in Kincardine.

CHURCHES WILL UNITE IN FOREIGN PLACES

To Support One Church for the English Speaking Population.
