# IT WAS A GREAT DAY FOR SENATOR COX

When the Government Yielded to the Seductions of the G. T. P.—Mr. Blair's Unanswered Exposure of the Real Inwardness of the Deal.

(Extract from Hon. A. G. Blair's speech on the G. T. P. in reply to Sir Wilfrid Laurier.)

Hon.
