THE LATE DR. DOLE

In the death of Dr. W. P. Dole St. John has lost a citizen of ripe scholarship, who was also a successful teacher, and a poet and essaysit who possessed a remarkably fine gift of felicitous expression. The general public knew comparatively little of Dr. Dole, for he was a man of quiet and scholarly tastes, who shunned rather than sought publicity. His writings, however, were very highly appreciated by those most competent to judge their merits, and he was a contributor to periodicals of the highest class. Dr. Dole studied law, but had little taste for the practice of the legal profession. His life was largely devoted to teaching, and as a teacher he has done notable service through a long period of years. For a time he was an inspector of public schools, and teachers who remember him as he was then are grateful for the kindly sympathy shown by him in relation to the problems which weed them. Dr. Dole lived to a ripe old age, and until within the last few months was a familiar figure on the streets of the city. 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


