Authorities Seek to Trace Capital Man

John Thomas - Faulk Is Known in Name But Not in Person

FREDERICTON, Jan. 7.—The mystery surrounding the person of John Thomas Faulk, a native of Virginia, whose relatives in Boston, Mass., have been endeavoring to trace in connection with his reported death, has been deepened with the discovery that there is a small piece of property on the Richibucto Road, in Devon, named in his name.

A few days ago Chief of Police Nathaniel Jones received a communication from Joseph Faulk, 28 Arnold street, Boston, Mass., addressed to "the chief of police, Fredericton, N.S.," thanking him for services performed in connection with the death of the writer's uncle and asking as to the disposition of the latter's property and effects. Chief Jones has so far been unable to secure any information as to the death of anyone by that name either in New Brunswick or Nova Scotia, or by the name of John Thomas, a name which the supposed deceased man is said to have used at times.
