

GIN REPLACED BY SALT WATER

Three Hundred Cases Shipped from Holland Changed Nature During Transit -Seeks Aero Rum Run-

New York, Nov. 28-Three hundred New York, Nov. 28—Three hundred cases of Geenva and Deptford gin shipped from Holland on the steamship Rotterdam in September of last year to McKesson and Robbins, druggists, turned to salt water before it was finally withdrawn from bond and delivered to the drug concern in October of this year, it was announced by Gus J. Simons, Chief Federal Prohibition Enforcement Agent for that state. The discovery of the substitution of the salt water for the gin was made to



by McKesson and Robbins after com-plaints from some of the retail drug customers, who in turn had received complaints from the persons who had

received the liquor on physicians' prescriptions. The wholesale druggists notified the prohibition authorities and gaugers were sent down to the warehouse by Mr. Simons. The guagers opened each case and found that every bottle was filled with salt water.

The supposed gin arrived in New York on the Rotterdam on Sept. 18, 1921, and was unloaded at the Bush Terminal in Brooklyn and then transported to the Independent Storage Warchouse, Inc., 415 Greenwich Street. The consignment remained in the warchouse until it was withdrawn on regular permits on Oct. 17, 1922. Chief Simons said he believed that the salt water was substituted for the gin while the consignment was en route from Rotterdam to New York.

Two formed Federal prohibition agents, Harry E. Mead and William F. Walsh, who with five others are on trial in the Federal District Court, were identified yesterday by Customs Inspector Robert J. Lawrence, stationed at Pier 18, North River, as the two prohibition agents who delivered three truckloads containing 160 barrels, supposed to be whiskey for shipment to Havana, Cuba. Instead of whiskey the barrels contained ginger ale.


