

## LID CLAMPED ON TAX PROBE

Drayton Refuses Further Information Regarding Riondons—Says the Act Won't Permit

(Staff correspondence Toronto Globe)  
Ottawa, Nov. 11.—Sir Henry Drayton today clamped the lid upon the government's methods of collecting income taxes.

No further information will be forthcoming, he declared, regarding the indefiniteness of the Riondon Pulp & Paper Co. or any other corporations or individuals who may have given notes in lieu of cash for their income taxes.

The Minister of Finance takes the ground that such information may only be given to members of parliament, and that he is not at liberty to give the information asked regarding the alleged practice of the government of tiding over large corporations by accepting promissory notes in payment of their taxes.

The section referred to by Sir Henry Drayton reads: "No person employed in the service of His Majesty shall communicate or allow to be communicated to any person not legally entitled thereto any information obtained under the provisions of this act, or allow any such person to inspect or have access to any written statement furnished under the provisions of this act."

It is pointed out that the provisions of this act are not at liberty to give the information asked regarding the alleged practice of the government of tiding over large corporations by accepting promissory notes in payment of their taxes.

Only in confidence. In the event of the Meighen government being returned, it is doubtful whether a full and satisfactory explanation would be given, unless the government saw fit to do so, for it will be remembered that in 1917 Sir Thomas White, then Minister of Finance, informed the Hon. F. B. Carvell that access to the files in any particular case might only be granted on condition that such information was supplied in confidence.

In the meantime the suspicion must rest in the public mind that the practice of accepting paper instead of cash for obligations to the government has been wide because of the knowledge that

the Riondon company has been accommodated by the government to the extent of about \$800,000, representing taxes and interest due the government over a period of years.

Who is Ellard? Herbert Miller Ellard, who hurried the Riondon income tax bomb into the torch camp, is a Gaitneau county farmer who cultivates about 1,400 acres of land in the vicinity of Greenfield. He is 40 years of age, tall, clean-shaven and quiet in manner. He entered politics, not much at the solicitation of others, but because, having the welfare of his country at heart, he felt that nothing could be done to improve conditions by remaining in the background. He is therefore contesting the seat as the Progressive candidate.

By a long series of manipulations, he says, the Riondon company secured powerful hold upon the Gaitneau valley. The company obtained the labor and materials of the inhabitants upon the condition that they would supply the Canadian industry. By reason of its financial resources the company now is almost defunct, and a result of Wright county faces a winter of unemployment and want.

Will Government Aid People? At the height of its prosperity, Mr. Ellard claims, the government came to the aid of this manhood company and allowed it to use the money rightfully belonging to the country in unwise financing. Now, he asks, will the government come to the aid of the inhabitants of Wright county in the same manner in which it stretched out a helping hand to this friendly private corporation? Will the Tory government come to the aid of the Wright county through a winter of want and privation, as it "patriotically" helped the big pulp and paper company? This is what Mr. Ellard calls putting a "horse-sense question to the government and its supporters," a question prompted by the feeling that it is high time to call spades by their proper name and to assert the common-sense spirit of the country in plain speech.

One Pays All Pay. Mr. Ellard declares that, as a farmer, he has always regarded taxes as taxes, and nothing else. He sees that the country needs badly the tax revenue, and as a farmer he is willing to pay his share, but he insists that every other individual and business in Canada be made to toe the mark. Not only is his own county suffering from loose administration, but the whole country, and he contends it is high time the acts of the Meighen government were subjected to serious scrutiny by the people.

## ADDITION TO HOSPITAL PLANT TO COST \$19,156

Tenders for the proposed extension of the epidemic hospital were opened at a special meeting of the board of commissioners of the General Public Hospital held yesterday afternoon and the lowest tender, made up of the various trades, amounted to \$19,156, or \$844 less than the lowest tender for the entire contract.

The board of commissioners voted to recommend the separate trade tenders for the approval of the finance committee of the municipal council. It was estimated by the architect that the total cost of the extension, according to his plans, should be about \$18,000.

In the appropriation for the present year the board of commissioners was granted \$10,000 for improvements for the epidemic hospital and of that sum about \$2,000 had already been spent, it was reported at the meeting, and about \$3,000 more still was required to complete the alterations and repairs to the present building.

The mayor and the wardens of the city some time previously had said they would support the presentation before the municipal council of a proposal to make an additional grant of \$10,000 to build an extension. The lowest tenders received are about \$6,000 greater than the amount which would be available if the additional \$10,000 should be granted.

No allowance for furnishing and equipping has been made. It was estimated that the cost of the extension would be about \$10,000, while the alterations and repairs to the present building would be about \$10,000.

Masonry, materials and labor, J. H. Parley, \$8,700; Walter W. Allingham, \$8,200. For the excavations and the foundation only, Peter F. Seap, \$1,900.

Carpentry, materials and labor, J. A. Adams, \$8,400; J. L. Belyea, \$18,281. Electric wiring and fitting, material and labor, Vaughan Electric Co., Ltd., \$2,000; Driscoll & MacKay, \$1,064; Frank E. Jones, \$1,198; the Web Electric Co., \$1,099.90.

Plumbing and heating, G. E. Blake, \$5,715; Joseph P. Henneberry, \$4,263; P. S. Walker, \$4,500.

The lowest tenders of the separate trades which have been ordered sent to the municipal finance committee are approved as follows: Masonry, J. H. Parley, \$8,700; carpentry, J. A. Adams, \$8,400; plumbing and heating, J. P. Corbett, \$20,000; electric, J. A. Grant & Co., Ltd., \$20,170; painting and glazing, J. H. Parley, \$8,700, making a total of \$19,156, or \$844 less than the lowest tender of \$20,000 by R. A. Corbett.

On motion, tenders were ordered as follows: Ventilation of a small room beneath the main entrance to be proceeded with by day labor; the fitting of a dander in the smoke box at the power house, at a cost of \$75, according to the tender of the Union Foundry Company, and the connecting of the exhaust pipe of the ammonia plant with the main steam pipe of the heating plant, at a cost of \$70, according to the tender of F. A. Walker.

CANADIAN BEER MEN HIT HARD

(Canadian Press Despatch). Montreal, Nov. 16.—Brewers and other liquor exporting interests in this city were perturbed today on learning that United States deputy secretary of customs Ashworth had issued an order to all United States customs officers along the Canadian frontier that no further shipments of alcoholic liquors were to be accepted for importation nor released for exportation until further notice.

It was stated today that the order would mean the crippling of the entire export trade from Canada to the British West Indies and immediate efforts will be made to have the United States authorities modify the new regulations.

LIBERALS HAVE FINE MEETING AT HILLSBORO

Hillsboro, Nov. 16.—The Liberal campaign in St. John-Albert was opened here this evening before an attentive audience numbering about 300 when H. R. McEllan and W. P. Broderick, the Liberal candidates, delivered strong addresses on the issues of the day. Both candidates made a national display of impression, Mr. McEllan being very effective in his exposure of the railway situation which he called a national crime.

Hon. C. J. Osmen, of Hillsboro, acted as chairman, and seated on the platform with him and the candidates were F. M. Thompson, S. S. Ryan, A. A. Stevens, Dr. Dash, all of Hillsboro, and E. J. Henneberry, of St. John. The audience was composed of Hillsboro people and those of the near-by districts who despite the bad condition of the roads and the cold weather turned out in force.

A feature of the gathering was the presence of a large number of ladies and young men. There was no heckling. Dr. Broderick, who was the first speaker, assured the gathering of his pleasure in being present to ask their support, not for himself, but for the grand old Liberal party.
